The silence of the people's party on the tariff question reveals their incapacity to meet the question—Woodburn Independent.

The sugar schedule is receiving more attention at present from the democratic subcommittee engaged on the tariff bill than any other feature of the bill. The committee has not yet decided upon any definite recommendation, and the outlook is not quite so bright for the sugar men as yesterday. The chances, however, are still favorable that some duty will be levied upon sugar.

The chamber of commerce of Portland has adopted resolutions against the passage of the Wilson bill. The only effect of the introduction of such resolutions before the board was to cause the members to define whether they are democrats or republicans. As to the effect it may have upon congress it may be said that it is an exact counterpart of the pope's bull against the comet.

In many respects the North Pacific Ocean resembles the North Atlantic. A great warm current, much like the Gulf Stream and of equal magnitude, called the Black Stream or Japan current, runs northward along the eastern shore of Asia. Advance figures of November exports from the United States show material decreases in leading articles. Cotton alone increased. The decrease particularly was marked in breadstuffs, wheat exports diminishing by 50 per cent as compared with November last year, flour by nearly 25 per cent and corn by 35 per cent. Provisions fell off by nearly 20 per cent, mineral oils by over 10 per cent. The total of these articles, which constitute a substantial majority of our total exports, was 13 per cent less than in the corresponding month of 1892. Omitting cotton, the total of the other leading articles of the first 11 months of the year, equivalent to 16 per cent. In these computations values are considered not quantities.

They argue that if the tariff is changed and the hard times continue many will be disposed to find in this change the cause of the depression, whereas if the tariff is allowed to remain as it is and times do not improve it will at once become apparent that the tariff had not caused the dullness of trade, and the people may be led to believe it was due to the scarcity of money. While, however, the silver republican senators will oppose the bill, will vote against it and will make special effort to defeat the clauses bearing upon the special interests of their respective states, it is probable that some of them will not aid their republican colleagues in securing delay upon the passage of the bill.
