SCHOOL ATTENDANCE.—The following figures will show a comparison in the attendance between last year and this year in our city schools: Total number enrolled the first month in 1892, 448; in the first month 1893, 433. Average daily attendance for the same time 398 and 398 respectively. Total number enrolled in five months in 1892-3, 557, 1893-4, 514. The average daily attendance for the fifth month in 1892, 421, in 1894, 417.

From the above figures it appears that there is a slight decrease in the attendance, and not enough to make any appreciable difference in the rooms. There are three rooms at this time having more than 60 in attendance.

One disadvantage in the present arrangement of the schools is the inability of the furnaces to warm the small recitation rooms in cold weather. It seems to do so. The capacity of the furnaces to do so. One of these rooms is occupied as a session room, and the other as a recitation room. All the available room in the building is used.
