The demand for clothing, long suspended, is growing greater than they can meet, in spite of the sacrifice of enormous stocks by embarrassed makers and merchants during the last few months. Their renewed activity is already taxing the capacity of the mills to supply cloth, and calling into active service thousands of workmen who have been idle for months. And what is true of other industrial centers and other departments of industry. The revival of business Chicago and the clothing trade is true of has begun more than hopefully. It only needs that the Senate should speedily complete the work of tariff readjustment in order that a great wave of prosperity may flow over the country. The sole danger now lies in Senatorial delay and the uncertainty it is capable of causing.
