THE ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING was held at the court house last evening. The chairman of the board of school directors being absent Prof. Crawford presided. The clerk C. H. Stewart, read his annual report showing the following:

Teachers salaries, principal, \$125 per month; assistants \$50, amount of insurance \$9,000. A report from Prof. Crawford showed the condition of the schools to be a prosperous one.

WILL BE ENFORCED.—Marshal Lee requests the DEMOCRAT to say that particular attention will be paid to the enforcement of the following sections of ordinance 132:
Section 7. That any person or persons who shall carry any deadly or dangerous weapons of any kind, whatever in a concealed manner within the corporate limits of the city of Albany, shall, upon conviction thereof before the recorder's court be fined not less than \$10 nor more \$100, or imprisoned in the city jail not less than five days nor more than fifty days, or both at the discretion of the court; Provided, that peace officers shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.
So much of the following as applies to the business part of First and Second streets, and elsewhere without care is used:
Section 41. No person shall ride a bicycle, unicycle, or tricycle, or any sidewalk in the city of Albany; Provided, That this section shall not apply to any cripple who shall use such vehicle for the purpose of travel. Any person violating the provisions of this section, shall, upon conviction thereof before the recorder's court be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50, or imprisoned in the city jail not less than two nor more than twenty-five days, or both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.
Section 22. Any person or persons who shall stand in or upon any street, alley or sidewalk within the corporate limits of the city of Albany, after being notified by any police officer of said city to move on, shall, upon conviction thereof before the recorder's court be punished by a fine not exceeding \$20, or by imprisonment in the city jail not exceeding ten days, or both, at the discretion of the court.

BIG BEAR STORY.—The monster bear of Admiralty Island, Alaska, which has long been a source of terror to the settlers in that locality, was recently killed, and the Alaska News, of Juneau, gives a long account of how the ferocious animal was made to bite the dust. A party of Indian hunters was organized, and armed with rifles and a bag of giant powder, started out for the bear's cave. Reaching the place where bruin was quietly sleeping, the leader, an Indian, threw the bag of powder into the cave, and then made a dive into the soft snow. "The bear," said one of the hunters, "jumped for the giant and fell and began to paw it. Zip! boom! bang! Bar's meat flew in all directions. The monster was blown into blasted meat, 100 pieces of meat were gathered, weighing 878 pounds. Eighteen buckshot and three bullets were found in the body. In shoveling the snow away in front of the cave to regain the captains gun, the skull of an Indian and bones of the human skeleton near a tree, a barrel of an old English shotgun and a Russian axe were found. The bear killer's gun was broken at the breech. He said that this bear had killed many Indians in the last 25 years. Having the honor of killing the monster, he celebrated his prowess by eating the tail and ears of the bear raw, hide and hair, all went down without the fellow even winking an eye."
