Congressman Blanchard has been appointed United States senator to succeed Judge White, whose resignation takes effect March 12.

Senator Martin, of Kansas, has introduced in the senate a bill which increases the pension of every person now on the rolls at \$8 a month, on account of services in the Mexican war, including the widows of all soldiers who served in that war, to \$12 per month.

It is positively stated the government will make no change in its attitude on the question of the protection of fur life in Behring sea. The regulations in the McCreary bill, recently introduced in the house, are considered within the decision of the Paris tribunal, and the government is not likely to recede from them.

War between the Catholics and Protestants has broken out in Memphis. The Protestant Pastors' Association has come out in a lengthy card, defending the principles of the American Protective Association, and attacking the Catholics, whom they charge with being engaged in a conspiracy to control all the officers of the town. The Protestants express a determination to carry it into the coming elections, and will endeavor to defeat every Catholic candidate for office. The publication of the card has caused a tremendous sensation.

Though white oats almost always bring highest prices in the market they are not always best for feeding, especially when given whole. More depends on the kind of husk or beard as regards fineness or harshness than upon its color. A black oat that has a soft husk is less apt to irritate the stomach than some of the white kinds, whose husk is nearly as harsh and stiff as that of barley, and which is injurious to the stomach. The very heavy oats are most apt to have this harsh character of husk, and for this reason the same weight with larger bulk of light oats is preferable for feeding.

The manufacture of lampblack, which is extensively used in the rubber and other grades, is an industry the extent of which is not readily understood. Two houses in New York alone handle over twenty thousand tons, one house in Glasgow as much more, and the quantities traded in Cincinnati and Chicago are of like proportions. Printer's ink is made on the basis of sixteen parts of lampblack, one part of linseed oil and one part of soap. Shoe blacking is made from lampblack, molasses and oil of vitriol. In every ton of fertilizer put upon the market there are fifty pounds of lampblack. A lampblack manufactory can be put up at the low cost of fifty dollars. It is made from the low grades of resin.

A decision by Judge Cronan of the United States Supreme Court practically makes the later State Commerce Law of no effect, but it is a plain constitutional point that the decision is based upon, and the decision is exactly what might have been expected. The decision is that parties who have been engaged in violating the provisions of the law cannot be compelled to give testimony that would criminate themselves, even though they are exempted from any liability to punishment by the amendment to the later State Commerce Law passed Feb. 13, 1893. This law is in contravention of the provision of the Constitution which protects the right of any man accused of crime to refuse to testify against himself. Of course where violations of the later State Commerce Law occur there are two parties to the crime, both equally guilty. It is possible that evidence may be secured in other ways, but the action of the law under this ruling must be very much restricted.

POPULARIZE THE INCOME TAX.

It seems to be conceded that the income tax will remain a part of the Wilson bill. Its opponents have done their worst against it and have failed. Even were sugar restored to the dutiable list it is unlikely that it would supersede the income tax, though this is the primary object of many who have been urging a restored tax on sugar.

While this is so The World does not hesitate to say that the income tax provided for in the Wilson bill is the most objectionable form in which it could be presented. To tax incomes of \$5,000 at the same rate as incomes of \$50,000 will have the effect, if it was not intended, of making the tax odious. The limit is too low. No income of less than \$50,000 per annum should be taxed at all. Incomes between \$5,000 and \$10,000 should not be taxed more than 1 per cent. Any deficiency this would produce in the needed revenue should be made up by a higher tax on the larger incomes. Any considerable amount taken from incomes of less than \$10,000 per annum is a levy upon the necessities and comforts of the people. For it must be borne in mind that "the necessities of life" is a relative term. Under modern conditions of living it can hardly be said that in taxing incomes between \$4,000 and \$10,000 per annum we are taxing only the surplus above what is required for necessities and comforts.

The World has long and consistently advocated a graded income tax, exempting all incomes of less than \$5,000 bearing very lightly upon incomes of less than \$10,000 and taxing only the unneeded surplus. It believes that such an income tax would be one of the fairest and least objectionable taxes that could be imposed by government. It would be a popular tax, for it would be objected to by but few and would interfere with the comfort of none. It would challenge but a small part of the hostility evoked by the tax as it stands in the Wilson bill. It would strengthen any party that introduced it into our fiscal system.

A WORKMAN'S TIME CHECKER.

An English time checker has been designed for use in factories and workshops for keeping a register of the time of the workmen. Its inventor claims that it is the only apparatus of the kind actuated and controlled by electricity. It contains no special clockwork and no complicated parts and requires no fixing. As many checks can be fitted to one clock as may be desired, and any ordinary clock can be adapted for the purpose. Each man is provided with a check, one of which he drops into the slot of the apparatus on entering the building. The checks are subsequently removed, and after their numbers have been registered placed on a board ready for the men to take when next leaving work. Any number of slots can be provided, but as a rule two only, marked respectively "entry" and "exit," are required. When the time for beginning work has gone by, the "entry" slot is closed by an electrical attachment, and the "exit" slot is opened. Before the next spell of work commences the "exit" slot is closed, and the "entry" slot is made ready to receive the checks of the workmen.
