SENATOR HILL AND THE INCOME.

It is evident that Senator Hill's resolution authorizing the Wilson bill is aimed principally at the provision for an income tax. The Senator has been reported as denouncing this tax as "undemocratic," and saying that it has never been endorsed by a Democratic National Convention.

Neither of these objections has any weight.

If equitable taxation is democratic, a proper income tax is not undemocratic. It is the most just and the least burdensome of taxes. Democracy seeks to observe the greatest number. The converse of that principle is equally democratic; the aim should, in apportioning the cost of Government, to impose the least hardship on the least number. A graded tax on large incomes is such a measure. If to tax men according to their ability to pay and according to the benefits they receive from the Government be not democratic, then Democracy is no longer the synonym of justice.

As to the party's declaration, the occasion for it had not arisen in the summer of 1892. The extent of the Republican deficiency was not then known. But the Democratic party has steadily declared in favor of "taxing luxuries heavily and taxing necessities lightly." A large income is the most concrete expression of luxury. It represents superfluity, indulgence, ease, enjoyment. The Democratic party has furthermore promised to reduce the tariff. It cannot do this without providing new sources of revenue. The Republicans guard against that by squandering the surplus and cutting off revenue in at once so certain and so little onerous as a tax on large incomes.

Senator Hill proposes to meet the Republican deficiency by additional or higher tariff taxes. Perhaps, in addition to restoring the duty on sugar, he would reimpose a duty on tea and coffee. This would provide the necessary revenue. But it would make the family of a workman pay as much towards the support of the Government as the family of a millionaire. This result would exactly suit the class that is objecting most loudly to an income tax. But this small class of rich tax dodgers is not the one with which Senator Hill has heretofore affiliated. Instead of fighting an income tax Senator Hill should seek by amendment to give the right principle truer application. He would do his country and his party a great service if he could change the bill so as to exempt all incomes below \$5,000, make a merely nominal tax on \$10,000 and a progressive tax beyond that amount. That would be just, scientific and democratic taxation.

Senator Henry Blackman, the newly appointed internal revenue collector, to succeed Colonel Milton Weidner, was to have been Inducted into office by Special Internal Revenue Agent McLaughlin, of San Francisco, at 6 o'clock this afternoon.

Pending his being sworn in, the senator was being greatly rushed with business today, and scarcely had even enough leisure to take a lunch. At 10 o'clock A. M. he announced the following appointments, which he has made with a view to their especial fitness for their respective parts, and their loyalty to democratic principles:

For the local office—Temporary chief clerk and cashier, J. Emmett Bellinger; office clerk, Randolph Harrison; and stenographer, John Rodgers, all of Portland. Traveling deputies—E. L. Mims, of Pendleton; J. B. Mulloy, of Portland; A. J. Barlow, of Gold Hill.

United States city gauger—Howard C. Dodson, of Heppner.

Chief Clerk J. Frank Davis, of the Weidner administration, will be retained as instructor.

For Washington, the traveling deputies are: John Nestor, with headquarters at Spokane; John Leahy, with headquarters at Walla Walla; store-keeper and gauger, M. S. Hellman, of Tacoma, with headquarters at Uniontown.

So far no appointments have been made for Seattle and Tacoma, Wash. and for Medford and Grant, Or., as these places are to be filled by the secretary of the treasury upon the recommendation of the collector. And at present the Chinese registration department also will remain undisturbed. —Telegram.
