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The Harrisburg Suicide.

The investigation before Coroner Norman, at Harrisburg, yesterday afternoon over the body of George Butler, found dead in the river on Sunday, revealed a peculiar suicide. Butler had evidently tried to shoot himself in the head at the bank of the river, but being a very nervous man, had after two shots been able to only get a bullet through the rim of the hat.

The report of the coroners jury was as follows: We the undersigned jury empaneled by the coroner to hold an inquest on the body of Geo. H. Butler, deceased, beg leave to report that we find no trace of violence on the body and that from the evidence allowed we concluded that he came to his death by drowning and that it was from his own voluntary act.

C. F. Wright and Son of Harrisburg Drowned in the Yachts

The news was received in Albany this morning with general regret that C. F. Wright and his fourteen years old son had been drowned in the Yachts below Waldport last Sunday. They were out on the rocks fishing. Mrs. Wright and daughter had been with them, but getting tired had gone back to their camp.

Mr. Wright was a well-known business man of Harrisburg, and was recently coroner, retiring from the office the first Monday in July. During his term he conducted several investigations over men who had been drowned, one at this city. He was about 45 years of age, and had been a resident of the county for a good many years.
