The property was owned by the Farmers Warehouse Union Company, composed of farmers and business men of Brownsville.

CITY COUNCIL.

Tuesday evening, Aug. 9.

Present, recorder, marshal, street superintendent, chief engineer and councilmen, Galbraith, Dannals, Senders, Hopkins, Martin and Grahams. In the absence of the Mayor, councilman Hopkins presided.

The following bills were allowed: Crane Co., \$70.00; F. L. Such, \$142.24; Mrs. M. G. Stetter, \$7.50; Miller & Stewart, \$25; John Jones, \$2.00; S. Conn, \$8.00; Elec. Co., \$142.00.

The committee on ways and means reported verbally on financial condition of city in connection with improving the water supply of the city, stating that the funds of the city were low, but speaking for the need of the improvement. In connection with it the report of the chief engineer was read showing that the cisterns were pumped out in periods up to 25 minutes, recommending the cleaning of the cisterns, the purchase of 500 feet of hose, there being 700 feet of good hose now, also a needed improvement of No. 2's engine.

Remarks were made by Galbraith, Grahams, Senders and Dannals.

The alley between second and third, Washington and Calapooia was ordered cut down to grade.

The chief engineer was instructed to have all cisterns cleaned and pipes to cistern at First and Washington flushed.

Upon motion of Galbraith, the recorder was instructed to advertise for laying pipe, iron or vitrified on Third St. from Vine to Lyon St., 12, 10 and 8 inches, for the purpose of furnishing sufficient supply of water for the cisterns. A survey was ordered made for the purpose.

The committee on fire and water was directed to have a cold water test of No. 2's engine made before next meeting.

The street superintendent reported work done to the amount of \$110.67.

The recorder reported a letter from Clapp & Jones quoting price of new boiler for No. 2's engine at \$850.

Upon resolution an 8 inch terra cotta pipe was ordered laid through blocks 14 and 26.

Mr. Crawford complained that cattle were damaging his property and he wanted the city to have it stopped. The recorder was instructed to notify the poundmaster to attend to the matter.

A communication was read by Mr. Swann from Hon. Geo. E. Chamberlain to Mr. Watson asking if some arrangement could not be made for paying to the King Bridge Co. the amount of money on hand for the purpose, \$7292.93, leaving the question of interest for the court.

Such arrangement was ordered made, upon stipulation satisfactory to the city.

Remarks were called for and made by S. E. Young, Chas. Pfeiffer, Judge Flinn and S. N. Steele on the water supply of the city in favor of prompt and systematic action.

No. 1's coke bin was ordered fixed. A light was ordered placed in the bell tower.

This call will realize about \$200,000, and more if needed, further special calls will be issued later.
