GERMAN AND BRITISH DOCTORS SIDE BY SIDE

Wounded Men of Both Forces Treated Alike by Red Cross.

London.—The Berlin Vossische Zeitung of a recent date publishes the following extract from a letter written by a wounded British soldier to his relatives. It reads:

"For three hours I lay among dead and wounded before English and German Red Cross ambulances arrived almost at the same time.

"The German and English doctors saluted, and then they worked together on adding the wounded.

"An English physician amputated the left leg of a soldier while a German physician administered narcotics to him."

"During the five battles in Galicia a woman, Anna Pelegrini of Bosen, was constantly in the firing line aiding the wounded soldiers." The Wiener Extrablatt asserts.

"Mrs. Pelegrini accompanied her husband from Innsbruck by showing a pass saying she was a nurse. The commander of the regiment tried to persuade her to leave the battlefield."

"I lost my nerve somewhat when the first bullets were flying over my head," she said, "but I soon was used to it and later I did not mind it at all. I was lucky to escape unharmed."

"Soon after this battle Mrs. Pelegrini lost sight of her husband and did not find him until several days later. He had been shot in the left shoulder and was taken care of in a field hospital."

Lieutenant A. C. Johnston, well known as Hamilton county premier cricketer, is beginning to believe that he bears a charmed life. He has been sent home wounded from the front, but he said he considers himself mighty lucky to be even alive. He had many narrow escapes from death. The day before he was wounded the nose of a shell hit a wall six inches over his head. Shortly after a bullet hit the ground a half yard ahead of him, glanced up and hit him on the body, only bruising him. Then a bullet hit him over the heart, but it was "spent," and he picked it out of his breast pocket and sent it home to his wife as a souvenir. His final escape came while he was sitting on the steps of a house. Half the building was blown up, and he was not even touched.

CHRISTENED IN AEROPLANE.

Chicago Youngster Named Ariel While 1,000 Feet Up.

Chicago.—Miss Ariel Villas, who has attained the dignity of four weeks, enjoys the distinction of being the first "aeroplane baby."

She was christened at a distance of approximately a thousand feet from the earth and surged with delight over the sensation of having a name bestowed upon her while soaring like a bird, with her father at the wheel.

Ariel is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Villas. They conceived the original idea of christening their first born in the air.

LEGISLATIVE HEADS FROM SAME COUNTY

Trenton, N. J., Jan. 12.—With both branches in control of the Republicans the New Jersey Legislature today began its 139th session. Both houses organized promptly at noon and received Governor Fielder's annual message. For the second time in the history of the state the presiding officers were today chosen from the same county. To Atlantic City went the honor of the state presidency and the speakership of the house.

In 1912, during the second year of President Wilson's administration as governor of this state, the Republicans secured control of the lawmaking will and choose two presiding officers from Passaic county, thus making the only precedent for Atlantic county's honor won today.

Forest Notes.

Forest fires in British Columbia covered more than 300,000 acres during the past year.

It is reported that there is a big market in Hawaii for box shooks for packing canned pineapple and pineapple juice.

During the past two years forest officers have killed nearly 9,000 predatory animals, more than three-fourths of which were coyotes.

The arboretum established at Washington and Rock Creek Park, through cooperation between the forest service and the District of Columbia, now contains 1200 trees, comprising 92 different species.

There were 400 fires this year on the national forests of Utah, southern Idaho, western Wyoming, and Nevada, for 15 more than in the most disastrous season of 1910. Yet the cost of extinguishing them was only one-third and the damage only one-third

of that of the earlier year. The difference is due to better organization now, and to more roads, trails, and telephones.
