Harrisburg, Jan. 12, 1915.—Last Fri-
day evening, Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Rob-
inson returned from the east after an
absence of six months. In July Mr.
Robinson was taken to Rochester,
Minnesota, in a berth and underwent
an operation at St. Mary's hospital.
Dr. W. J. Mayo removed the right
kidney and traced the cause of his
trouble to an accident in 1896. Owing
to the long standing of the case, the
condition of Mr. Robinson was serious
and recovery slow, being under
daily attention at Mayo's clinic for
four months. They have not dis-
missed the case but granted leave of
absence to see what time will develop.
They have been for the past few
weeks at Gilman, Iowa, with W. D.
Fantom and wife, who is a sister of
Mrs. Robinson. Upon their arrival
at Harrisburg twenty of their friends
met them at the depot and going to
their home with them where a num-
ber of ladies had opened and warmed
the house. They all sat down to a
splendidly prepared supper that was
much appreciated after the long tire-
some journey. They express them-
selves as being glad to get back to
Oregon away from the cold and snow
now prevalent in the East.

to all the stockholders. A semi-an-

The Law Governing Saving De-
posits in This Bank.

Any bank combining any of the
business of a commercial bank, trust
company and savings bank shall keep
separate books or accounts for each
department, and shall keep all moneys
received as such deposits, and the funds
and securities in which the same are
invested, at all times segregated from
and unmingled with the other moneys
and funds of the bank, and all bonds,
warrants, notes, mortgages, deeds and
other securities of every nature of such
savings department shall be marked, stamped
or labeled "savings department,"
or some similar words. All funds,
investments and other assets of the
savings department shall be held
solely for the repayment of the
depositors in said department and
shall not be liable for, or used to pay
any other obligation or liability of the
bank until after the payment in full
of all depositors of said savings
department.

The savings deposits of any
bank maintaining a savings depart-
ment may be invested only in
bonds, warrants and mortgages.

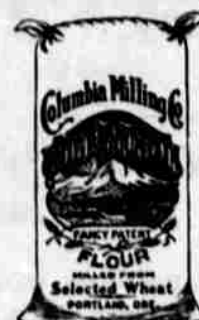
