REBELS ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE MEXICAN CAPITAL

(By United Press Association.)
San Antonio, Jan. 16.—Mexico City is besieged by Generals Obregon and Sanchez, according to advices received by the local constitutionalist consul. Guiterrez, the dispatch said, asked Villa for reinforcements. Another dispatch from Vera Cruz said that Queretaro had been attacked by 10,000 constitutionalists.

NEWSPAPERS ARE SAVED FOR STATE CHARGES

Salem, Jan. 15.—(Special to Democrat.)—A resolution has been introduced in the senate by Senator Garland of Linn county, which has for its purpose the distribution of the newspapers from the two houses of the legislature each day, among the various state institutions including the penitentiary and state hospital.

At present the newspapers read by the legislators reach the waste paper basket each night. Senator Garland intends that the papers shall be distributed among the inmates of the institutions for their benefit, after they have been perused by the legislators.

A similar resolution was introduced in the house this week by Representative Childs of Linn, and under suspension of the rules, was passed.

Teddy Van Dyke is a new pupil who falls in love with Louise Storm, the Major's daughter by a first marriage, Louise, Miss Irene Wright, has exquisite arms, dances artistically and is good to look at. Major Storm, George Dayton, is a big, handsome chapp who hasn't told his daughter about his marriage to Teddy's mother. Of course there is a grand mixup about the relation of the various characters. Everyone of the men is in love with Argentine or has been at some time and before the end is reached finally many amusing situations arise. A generous supply of laughs is in store for all who watch the unravelling of the tangle.
