SHIPPING PROFITS

Philip Hanson of New York, whose own shipping interests entitle him to speak as an authority, declares in a letter to the Philadelphia Record, that "private interests will never build an American merchant marine, because they can operate their vessels cheaper under foreign flags; and we will never grant a subsidy, because the normal profits in the shipping business are so large that, even under the increased cost of American operations, extraordinarily large dividends are possible, and no congress will dare to grant a subsidy to make up the difference between the large profits possible under the American flag and the greater profits possible under foreign flags."

These are frank words, and their importance are not to be under-estimated. Here is a man who has himself established a successful steamship line, testifying that the normal profits of the shipping business, even under the increased cost of American operation over operation under foreign flags, are large, that "extraordinarily large dividends are possible." Unlike some of his business competitors, Mr. Hanson is content with such profits and does not ask that they be swollen by special privilege legislation in the form of ship subsidies.

This frank and fair shipping man favors the administration shipping bill now before congress. He points out the need of an American merchant marine and the self-evident fact that private interests will never build it "because they can operate their vessels cheaper under foreign flags" despite the fact that "extraordinarily large dividends are possible" under the "somewhat increased cost of American operations."

Mr. Hanson's statement is illuminating. It reveals the true reason for the opposition to the administration's shipping bill. Selfish interests, not content with "extraordinarily large dividends," cry for still more, and hope to secure them by means of ship subsidies. The establishment of a government owned merchant marine would demolish their last hope of ship subsidy legislation. Hence the frenzied opposition to the administration measure.

Governor Colquitt of Texas has an obsession that if he was president of the United States the millennium would be at hand. There is not the slightest probability that the Texas fire-eater ever will be president (for which thanks be,) but it pleases him to tell what he would do if he was. It enables him to get his name in the papers and some of the bile out of his system, and does no particular harm because nobody takes him seriously. Colquitt's latest attack upon President Wilson is as full of untruth and absurdity as most of his reported utterances in the past have been, and that is as much in the way of a reply as it needs to be dignified with.

Seventy cents of every dollar paid to the federal government for revenue goes to maintain the army and navy. The jingoes won't be satisfied until the percentage is raised to at least ninety-nine.

Senator Lodge may as well give up all thoughts of re-election. He admits such gross ignorance of a great American institution that he doesn't even know who Connie Mack is.

The Law Governing Saving De-
posits in This Bank.

Any bank combining any of the
business of a commercial bank,
trust company and savings bank
shall keep separate books or ac-
counts for each department, and
shall keep all moneys received as
such deposits, and the funds and
securities in which the same are
invested, at all times segregated
from and unmingled with the other
moneys and funds of the bank, and
all bonds, warrants, notes, mort-
gages, deeds and other securities
of every nature of such savings de-
partment shall be marked, stamped
or labeled "savings department,"
or some similar words. All funds,
investments and other assets of the
savings department shall be held
solely for the repayment of the
depositors in said department and
shall not be liable for, pledged as
security for, or used to pay any
other obligation or liability of the
bank, until after the payment in
full of all depositors of said sav-
ings department.

The savings deposits of any
bank maintaining a savings depart-
ment may be invested only in
bonds, warrants and mortgages.
