BERLIN WILD AS KAISERIN SMILES

Thousands at Palace Windows
After Hearing of Victory.

NEWS AS GERMANS GET IT.

Stories of Great Success Against the Russian Forces in East Prussia—Russians Rode Into Mouths of Machine Guns, and Hundreds Were Killed. Say Czar's Men Are Careless.

New York.—The enthusiasm of the crowds in Berlin over German successes is depicted in a dispatch to the Koenigsberg Zeitung from Berlin. The dispatch contains the first mention of the kaiserin's presence in Berlin since the beginning of hostilities and tells of a touching scene around the imperial palace. The dispatch says:

"A large crowd of people assembled in front of the palace last night and with great enthusiasm called time and again for the kaiserin. As stated in the Vossische Zeitung (the official organ), the latter appeared twice at a window and waved to the crowd, deeply moved. A man in the crowd made a short address, and the kaiserin waved her thanks to him. Then she withdrew.

"But the crowd continued to wait for her to reappear until a late hour. At 11 o'clock it was scarcely believed by any one that the kaiserin would show herself again. Suddenly the curtain of her window was seen to move. The kaiserin appeared and waved to the crowd. Behind her stood the crown princess. The whole scene lasted only a minute or two, and then everything was dark again. Then a movement was noticed behind a large balcony window in the middle of the palace. The doors were opened, and the kaiserin and the crown princess stepped out, followed by a man in civilian attire.

"Noticeably deeply moved, the kaiserin waved her handkerchief. The crown princess with an extremely

graceful gesture asked for silence. The crowd suddenly became quiet, whereupon the man in civilian attire, a brother of War Minister von Falkenhahn, made an announcement which was interpreted by the crowd as another report of a victory. Then expressions of great joy burst forth such as will never be forgotten. The scene on the balcony was equally impressive. The kaiserin in tears embraced the crown princess, and the mother and daughter kissed each other. After the crown princess had kissed the kaiserin's hand both were compelled to wave acknowledgment of the crowd's joyous cries.

A dispatch in the Koenigsberg Zeitung contains a description of a battle between the Germans and Russians on the border line in East Prussia, and the writer, who professes to have taken part in the victorious German assault, satirizes the valor of the Russian officers.

"The Russians," he says, "rode practically into the mouth of our machine gun fire as a result of their unusual carelessness. In a few minutes the entire oncoming force of horsemen were piled up in a shapeless mass. On closer examination we found that practically all of the horses as well as the men were dead, so terrible was the effect of our fire at a range of scarcely more than 300 yards. We were astonished when we discovered that in the countless number of dead Russians, except for a few petty officers, there was not a single officer of higher rank. The puzzle was soon solved. A patrol that we sent out found the entire company of officers together a mile or two to the east. They preferred to view the fighting from a safe distance and to let their men run up against us practically without any direction. They were, of course, made captives at once."

Would Abolish Station Porters.

Chicago, Jan. 19.—Insistent demand will be brought to bear on hotel keepers and station masters throughout the United States to abolish the railway station porter, if the plans announced today of C. A. Wooley, of Chicago, are successful. Porters demand exorbitant tips and enforce their demands by roughly handling the baggage. As an institution they are a "survival of obsolete conditions," says Wooley. "Why should men and women who must travel be assailed wherever they stop by a crew of men yelling like maniacs and trying to snatch their baggage away?"

The movement has the backing of the United States Commercial Travelers.

Belgians Cannot Come Just Now.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 19.—Belgium cannot now cooperate with organizations of Nebraskans or with citizens of other states to organize a movement to place on farms in this country desirable immigrants from that stricken land. A letter from Minister Havenith of Belgium to Secretary Whitten of the Lincoln Commercial club conveys this information.

The letter came in reply to one sent by Secretary Whitten to Secretary of State Bryan, which Mr. Bryan turned over to the Belgian minister. In his communication, Mr. Whitten emphasizes the desirability of making an organized effort to choose the best of the Belgian farmer class who are expected to leave Europe as soon as they can, and place them on farms in the middle west.

The Belgian minister expressed his gratification at the interest taken in his people by the people of Nebraska. But he says that under the present conditions it would be impossible to take up any such plan just now, but that he would be glad to cooperate in such movement later.

PERKINS MAY BE TRIED FOR MURDER THIS WEEK

Columbus, S. C., Jan. 19.—The federal district court's January term opened here today with the case on the docket of George B. Perkins, of Boston, charged with murder on the high

seas. He shot and killed F. W. R. Hinman, manager of the Jacksonville, Fla., "Times Union" and wounded two others last November off Charleston, S. C. on the steamer Mohawk.

A jury in Perkins' case will probably be called Jan. 22. Postponement of the trial is possible however, because of Perkins' poor physical condition. He has been in Roper Hospital in Charleston since his arrest on the Mohawk.

Since his brother-in-law, Herbert H. Holton of Boston, left Charleston some weeks ago, few persons have seen Perkins, whose frenzy is said to have been caused by an overdose of headache powders. Perkins attempted to cut his throat with a razor on November 16 and has been under strict surveillance, although he is said not to be despondent. He is extremely reticent, however.

Captain Ingram of the Mohawk and B. R. Wright, a passenger, both of whom were shot by Perkins, are likely to be witnesses. They and Hinman, who was also president of the Southern Newspaper Publishers' association, were talking in the lower deck saloon of the Mohawk when Perkins opened fire upon them without warning.

The prosecution is in charge of U. S. District Attorney Francis H. Weston and his assistant, J. Watts Waring.
