AN EXECUTIVE SPOILSMAN.

Governor Withycombe, did you not take a solemn oath to uphold the laws of the state of Oregon? If such oath was made in good faith why is it that as chief executive you violate the spirit of section 4252 of Lord's Oregon Laws? Why are two highly capable and honorable members of the board of regents of the Oregon Agricultural college unceremoniously superseded by two of your close personal and political friends? Is it because the retiring members of the board happen to be Democrats? Do you place partisanship above citizenship? Is there not enough legitimate patronage with which to reward your friends without invading the realm of higher education? Must you trample under foot the law of the state in order to make places for the faithful?

Governor Withycombe, for your information we quote below from Section 4252, L. O. L., (Board of Regents):

"The said board of regents shall consist of thirteen members, of whom the members of the state board of education, and also the master of the state grange for the time being shall be ex officio members. The other nine (9) members of the board shall be appointed by the governor, by and with the advice of the senate, not more than five of which nine (9) members appointed by the governor shall belong to the same political party."

In the face of the above provision of the law the governor has seen fit to replace Regents B. F. Irvine and E. E. Wilson, both of whom are Democrats, with two Republican appointees. Against the men appointed we have no complaint. They are worthy and well qualified. But against the governor's action in violating the spirit of a law which was designed to remove the institutions of learning from the sphere of partisan politics, we do complain and our complaint is registered in no uncertain terms. As the board of regents stands since the new appointments were made, it consists of seven Republicans and two Democrats. If able and conscientious Democrats are "persona non grata" upon the board of regents at Corvallis, will they not be equally distasteful to the governor at all other educational institutions in the state?

Be it remembered in this connection that Governor West was repeatedly accused by the friends and supporters of Governor Withycombe of usurpation of power. Yet during the his tenure of office, Governor West respected the provision of the law quoted above and maintained on the board of regents of the Oregon Agricultural college, five Republicans and four Democrats.

The Democrat does not blame Withycombe for retaining a Republican after his election. We respect any man who makes no apology for his faith and who sees fit to reward the deserving and efficient members of his own political party when the opportunity affords itself. But we do blame Withycombe for his extreme partisanship in carrying his politics into the institutions of learning and making appointments which are contrary to the rules laid down by our lawmakers. Governor Withycombe has a perfect right, as a Republican executive, to fill purely political offices with members of his own party if he can find men of his own faith who are competent. He has neither justice, precedent, law, or common sense upon his side of the argument however, when he attempts to use the yardstick of partisanship in passing upon the qualifications of members of the board of regents of any of the various state institutions.

The Law Governing Saving Deposits in This Bank.

Any bank combining any of the business of a commercial bank, trust company and savings bank shall keep separate books or accounts for each department, and shall keep all moneys received as such deposits, and the funds and securities in which the same are invested, at all times segregated from and unmingled with the other moneys and funds of the bank, and all bonds, warrants, notes, mortgages, deeds and other securities of every nature of such savings department shall be marked, stamped or labeled "savings department," or some similar words. All funds, investments and other assets of the savings department shall be held solely for the repayment of the depositors in said department and shall not be liable for, pledged as security for, or used to pay any other obligation or liability of the bank until after the payment in full of all depositors of said savings department.

The savings deposits of any bank maintaining a savings department may be invested only in bonds, warrants and mortgages.
