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**LEGISLATOR RECEIVES LOAN-BOOK AFTER 12 YEARS**

Salem, Or., Feb. 11.—Twelve years ago in his home town of Fossil, Representative James T. Stewart lent Rev. C. A. Brackenbury his autograph copy of Ian MacLaren's "Companions of the Sorrowful Way." The minister had failed to return it and Mr. Stewart long ago developed cruel thoughts toward the dominie. What was the legislator's surprise yesterday, however, when someone poked him in the back as he sat at his desk and a voice said, "Here's your book."  
Turning around, Mr. Stewart saw the minister who had long ago moved to Brownsville, but who had brought the book when business called him to Salem.  
"I forgive you," cried Stewart. "I'm so glad to get the book that I would forgive anything."  
Here is how Mr. Stewart got the book in the first place:  
Dr. MacLaren, whose real name was Dr. John Watson, was born in the old Scotch town of Blairgowrie, Perthshire. Some 20 years later Stewart was born in the same town and when he went to school it was at the same school house. Growing to manhood, Stewart and Dr. Watson became fast friends and after the younger man had moved to America, he kept track of the distinguished writer.  
Many years ago Dr. Watson was in Portland and Stewart travelled all the way from Fossil to meet him again. It was at the Portland hotel that they met and Dr. Watson gave him the book.  
"I will remember the last words he said to me," Stewart said last night. "He was starting for the stairs and turning, shouted so all could hear: 'Stewart, Stewart, remember the murr o' Blair.' That is where we played cricket in the good old days."
