THREE PRESIDENTS.

The birthday anniversaries of two great presidents, both occurring in February, are of especial significance this year, because the problems of the present times are little less momentous than those which Washington and Lincoln had to face.

Washington, born 138 years ago February 22, was, as every school-boy knows, the "first in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen." As the initial president of the new republic, he had a stupendous task to perform—the task of coalescing the thirteen squabbling, stubborn colonies into a semblance of government, and of winning for that government the recognition and respect of older nations. Not the least of his accomplishments was to steer the infant republic over the dangerous shoals of "entangling alliances." To Washington's courage and vision we are indebted for the broad principles which have kept us out of the old-world politics and established the basis of our present neutrality.

Abraham Lincoln, who would have been 106 years old had he lived to February 12 last, was destined to guide the ship of state during the four stormiest and darkest years of its voyage, up to the present time. During his administration the greatest crisis in our history was met—and overcome. A question which had threatened the permanency of the nation from its beginning was settled for all time. The Union was preserved, and the danger of its dissolution, which had hung like an ever-blackening cloud for half a century, was dispelled. To establish the union was Washington's province; to preserve it, Lincoln's. Both these presidents are imperishable in our history.

Today our country is confronted by graver problems than any other presidents but Washington and Lincoln have had to face. With half the world at war and delicate situations arising almost daily that threaten to drag us in, the problem of meeting them in such a way as to conserve both our peace and our honor is a tremendous responsibility. Fortu-

nate, indeed, is our country that in this great crisis, the wisdom, courage and foresight of Washington and the patience, faith and determination of Lincoln are blended in the third great American president—Woodrow Wilson.

GOOD TIMES FOLLOW BAD.

One strange thing about depressed business conditions is that those passing through them expect them never to end. They entirely forget that the country has passed through many such periods of depression and finally emerged from them and quite as speedily forgot all about them. Very few of us have learned the lesson they taught and very few will learn any lesson from what we are now experiencing. The American temperament is mercurial because it is usually optimistic. We are a hopeful race so long as things are coming our way, but when the tide sets against us we are inclined to be a pessimistic race. As a matter of fact we have been the curled darlings of fortune the world over. Things have come very easy indeed for us and we have set standards in living for ourselves which it is not easy to maintain when times slacken a little bit. No race of people on earth so discount the future.

But all this aside, what we are now passing through is a temporary condition that will pass away. There are immediately ahead of us better times, and while they are not likely to open up with a full head of steam on, there are not wanting signs to show that they are opening up nevertheless and the beginning of better times is just ahead of us. For those with money there was never in our whole history a better time for investments. The time to buy is when the prices are low. It is not likely they will be as low again for years to come.

The lesson to be learned is that hard times as well as good times in our present stage of disoriented development are but passing phases of our existence, and the wise man is he who keeps a pretty even keel through all phases, whether of good or bad times. The fact to get into our heads is that depressed times are proof that better times are coming, for always one has followed the other, and even comparatively young men have experienced many alternating phases of them from '73 down to date.—Tele-gram.
