DO THE TIMES DEMAND
WOMEN POLICE MATRONS?How large should a city be to have
a woman police patrol, is a question
agitating Medford. The Sun says:Declaring that nothing was more
demoralizing than an immoral wom-
an, Councilman Col. H. H. Sargent
at Tuesday night's meeting of the
city council made a motion that a
police matron be appointed, at a sal-
ary of \$75 per month, to work as a
protective and preventative officer
and to save young girls and boys
whom he alleges roam the streets of
Medford at all hours of the night.
After considerable discussion a vote
was taken and the measure lost 4-2.
Councilmen Sargent and Mann were
in favor of the appointment of a po-
lice matron. Councilmen Medynski,
Hargrave, Miles and Amy as well as
Mayor Emerick were in favor of put-
ting it to a vote of the people but
think the city too small and too far
in debt to pay \$75 a month for awoman police officer at this time.
The Greater Medford club as well
as the other woman organizations of
the city are heartily in favor of the
appointment of a police matron and
the matter will in all probability be
