WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY.

This is the birthday of George Washington, father of our country, the man who has always been first in the hearts of his country. His memory is unstained, and his name stands out a perpetual monument in this country to true manhood and unquestioned patriotism. Others have done a great service in the building up of this leading commonwealth of the world; but the name of Washington stands first.

The country was fortunate in having a Thomas Jefferson, foreseeing with a vision of depth, who comprehended in a marvelous manner the inalienable rights of mankind. It was a great thing for the United States that the head of the supreme court, Chief Justice Marshall was a deep student of law and principle of government. Our country needed a Daniel Webster to interpret for all time the provisions of our constitution, and establish it on a basis of granite. Abraham Lincoln must have been fashioned for the work of making this country the home of the free regardless of color, leaving a name that grows in lustre as the years pass. The United States is specially fortunate in having at its head during these days of war's passion, a man of force, with an honest purpose, loving peace and seeking the good of mankind regardless of the demagogues and savage blarney of the age, determined on keeping the bonds of the government immune from the bloodstains of humanity.

But it was George Washington, who more than any one else, made the achievements of these men possible. The people of the United States do well to keep green the memory of this man, an example for all regardless of age. We might well emulate him in his unselfishness and seek to establish in our own lives, so much needed, that sterling character of honesty that marked his career.

TELLING THE TRUTH.

The reputation for being truthful has always counted for much in the minds of the people. Whether the story about George Washington is true or not it has always counted as a large asset in the record of his life. As an example for the youth of America it has undoubtedly had a marked influence. The business man does not have a better name than that for absolute integrity in his expressions. Any man is fortunate in having it said of him: "His word is as good as his bond." Along any line the reputation for reliability is of immense benefit as an advertising agency alone. It should not, though, be courted as a matter of business, but as a principle. In this age when many men use falsehood to advance their interests, politically, commercially and socially, it is worth while to consider the subject.

MAKING A CITY BEAUTIFUL.

A timely subject at this season of the year is that of beautifying our cities. Already campaigns have been begun in the valley. Good streets, pretty residences, neat lawns, general attractive surroundings conduce in a marked manner to give a city a reputation upward. Albany already is considered as pretty a city as there is in the state. It should continue to go ahead along same lines. Much that goes to embrace the attractiveness of a city is less a matter of expense than of industry. A little work, given with regularity, will transform a place. The springtime idea is to secure a unanimity of purpose among the residents of a city, so that a whole city will show the efforts made, and not special sections.

WHAT IS SAID ABOUT
OVERHEAD VALVES

Read what the Motor Age says
about overhead valve motors in their
issue of April 30th, page 12, from
which we quote as follows:

"There are at present twelve different car makers building valve-in-the-head motors. This number gives promise of being materially increased before the end of the year. Recently one manufacturer who heretofore has not used the valve-in-the-head has brought out a model of this type. There are other contemplating similar steps before the close of the present year.

"Valve-in-the-head motors gave promise five or six years ago, of having an increasing following in America, but unfortunately at that time questions of valve materials, camshaft drive, lubrication of parts, and additional noise were factors working against it. The valve-in-the-head motor was higher than the T or L types. This brought the valve-oper-

ating parts close to the top of the bonnet, where the bonnet metal acted more or less in the nature of a sounding board and made a noisy car.

"With the noise factor of the valve-in-the-head motor well eliminated and with the height not so great a relative factor as it was 5 or 6 years ago, this type of motor is bound to attract more attention in these days when motor efficiency is being talked of in every city and hamlet. Makers of valve-in-the-head motors are staging fuel economy tests in many sections of the country, and are as regularly demonstrating that this design of motor with its more compact combustion chamber gives more power than the T or L head types of the same size, and generally at a lower gasoline consumption. No comparative figures have been announced recently from official tests of the relative power of T-head, L-head and valve-in-the-head motors of the same cylinder dimensions. Some years ago one maker built motors of the same cylinder sizes with T-head and valve-in-the-head arrangements, and announced 15 per cent higher power from the valve-in-the-head type. With the higher efficiency obtained of late from T-head designs, it is probable that this margin may have been reduced in the last five years.

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"European builders of racing cars have for several years recognized the merit of placing the valves in the head. The winners of the grand prix race for several seasons has used the valve-in-the-head motors. The winner of the Indianapolis 500-mile race last year had a motor with four valves in the head of each cylinder, and a majority—in fact, nearly all—of the European cars entered for the 500-mile race this season have been designed with all valves in the cylinder heads."

DAYS OF THE "ROBERT E. LEE" COMING BACK

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 22.—River traffic between St. Paul and New Orleans was given quite a boost today, when the city council of St. Paul took up the matter of building a terminal in one of the most convenient spots for river shippers.

J. H. Bernhardt of New Orleans is organizing a \$5,000,000 company, to be known as The Mississippi River Navigation Co., which shall have for its object the operation of a barge line on the Mississippi.

It was Bernhardt who, last summer, ran a barge from New Orleans to St. Paul and back, just to demonstrate the possibilities of river navigation between these points.
