A MARKET CITY.

The making of Albany a market city is a cause worthy of the enterprising business men of this city. The move started in this direction should be promoted with persistence. It will be a useless effort if it stops with a single experiment. The need is to make it a permanent affair, so that it will be like an established institution in a city. Whatever brings business to a city should be pushed continuously, not next Saturday alone, nor a month later, but during the coming years. "Keeping everlastingly at it" has been declared the secret of success in any line. Many men have risen in their business or professional field in this way. 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Albany, OregonEUGENE APPOINTMENT
MADE ON SATURDAYA Campbell Secures the Plum
Among Six Candidates, After
Live Campaign.

Eugene, Or., Feb. 20.—Completely ignored by the administration in the appointment of the \$3100 postmaster, the Lane county Democratic organization was visibly agitated this afternoon upon word of the nomination of E. L. Campbell, a Democrat outside the fold, to succeed J. L. Page, postmaster.

Although there were six candidates, the complete confidence in which the Central committee relied on its recommendations intensified the blow. It was the same Democratic committee that spent its money in conducting the Chamberlain campaign last year.

"I guess the party wants a unanimous election here next time," was the comment of Lee Travis, Democratic chairman.

Lee Campbell, the successful nominee, is proprietor of the Savoy Theater. He was born in Eugene in 1865, and his father was a Lane county pioneer. His brothers, John Campbell and Ira Campbell, published the Daily Eugene Guard for a quarter of a century, and finally sold it to Lee Campbell, who had learned the printing trade in his brother's plant. He was editor for seven years, when he sold it to Charles Fisher and entered the furniture business six years ago. While editor of the Guard Mr. Campbell was an ardent Democrat.

The Eugene campaign is said to have been a fierce one. One man even had a campaign manager and headquarters, and the mails were kept flooded with literature and letters. The whole valley was raked for signatures, and local interest was emphatic.

CELEBRATION FIFTY
YEARS AGO TODAY

Albany, Ore., Feb. 22, 1915.

Editor Democrat—Fifty years ago yesterday Companies B and F, 1st Oregon Infantry Volunteers, the former from Yamhill and Washington counties and the latter from Linn county, celebrated Washington's birthday by a dress parade at Fort Hoskins, King's Valley, Benton county, Oregon, standing in snow about one foot deep.

The above companies were mustered in at the fair grounds near Salem, called for the time "Camp Russell," with the following commissioned officers: B Co., Captain, Ephraim Palmer; 1st Lieutenant, Cyrus H. Walker; 2nd Lieutenant, John W. Cullen. F Co., Captain, Abner W. Walker; 1st Lieutenant, Darius B. Randall; 2nd Lieutenant, James A. Blach.

All three of the last named officers are decorated lieutenants; Randall having been killed at the outbreak of the Nez Perce war in Idaho in the spring of 1877. His people live near Seio. Of B company, only Captain Palmer is dead. As far as known the following are the only members of Company F, now living in Linn county: Samuel W. Carter, Lebanon; Sergeant William M. Hilleary, Brownsville; W. H. Klub, Lebanon; David E. Junkin, Shedd; John Lower, Albany. One other prominent member was J. Fred McCoy, of Spokane, Wash., a
