OHIO MAY PAY THE FAMILIES OF DRUNKARDS

Columbus, O., Feb. 24—Payment of state compensation to the dependents of drunkards is the plan embodied in a bill introduced during the present session of the Ohio legislature by Representative Van S. Deaton.

Deaton would have the liquor interests foot the bill and the state make the awards under a system similar to the present workmen's compensation act.

"This is chief among the many 'freak' measures introduced. Others include: Prohibiting display of any red or black flag or any emblem 'hostile to the established government;' protection for skunks; and a bill provided that no one, not even the owner, may drive an automobile without first having passed a state examination.

The perennial anti-cigarette and anti-tipping, and abolition of capital punishment bills have bubbled up again. The capital punishment measure embodies a new idea. Its author would have the governor fix the dates for all executions on the theory that no chief executive would take the responsibility for ordering the execution of murderers.

Some of these measures already have met the usual fate of 'freak' bills having been smothered in committee. Others are receiving consideration and may be enacted into laws.

AUSTRALIANS TO ORGANIZE. San Francisco, Feb. 24—Arrangements have just been completed here for the organization of a permanent Australian society. The arrangements were made at a meeting of the various Australian state commissioners to the Panama-Pacific Exposition and prominent Australian and New Zealand business men.

The Australian state commissioner will register the names of all resident Australians and New Zealanders with a view of securing their co-operation in a number of special events that are to be held in conjunction with the exposition.
