DID THE LEGISLATURE SAVE.

The Democrat with other papers
 has published figures showing what
 the recent state legislature saved the
 people. On the face of it it looks as
 if there had been a saving of over
 \$300,000; but according to the Salem
 Journal, which has been making a
 special study of the situation the ac-
 tual figures will show a total expendi-
 ture of \$7,387,040.63 for the state
 government, instead of \$6,310,648.67.
 The real work of the legislature is
 shown in the excess of the net appro-
 priations of the 1913-1914 legislature
 over the appropriations of the recent
 legislature for 1915-1916. The excess
 is \$644,500.05. The charge is also
 made that there was not a single piece
 of constructive legislation during the
 entire session, no good roads legisla-
 tion, no provision for irrigation or
 power development, and in short
 nothing but the tearing down of what
 had previously been accomplished.
 The Democrat has not yet attempted to
 go into the matter. It simply gives
 the Journal's contention in order that
 the readers of the paper may know
 that there are two sides to all ques-
 tions, including this one.

ALBANY A NATURAL CENTER.

The manner in which Albany is
 being used as a convention city for big
 and small gatherings along all lines
 deserves to be kept before our people,
 as an important asset for the city. It
 means much that Albany is ideally lo-
 cated for such gatherings, being very
 easy of access, a real center for travel.
 Besides this the reputation of the city
 as host is widespread and of a high
 order. Albany is considered to be
 one of the prettiest cities in the state.
 If any one is doing anything to de-
 tract from this the suggestion is made
 right here to get busy and eliminate
 whatever is objectionable in the scenic
 effect of one's surroundings. Albany
 has the best hotels of any city in
 the state outside of Portland, accord-
 ing to statements frequently made,
 always a drawing card for a city as
 a convention center. There are other
 attractions that bring conventions
 here, and we are proud of all of them.

COMMUNITY GATHERINGS.

A commendable feature of life in
 Linn county is the community meet-
 ings held under the direction of the
 county school superintendent's office.
 Assisted by other county officials and
 prominent educators and specialists
 the meetings are full of good things.
 Specially deserving of praise is the
 fact that these meetings do much to
 bring people together in a manner to
 advance their interests mentally, so-
 cially and even commercially, for
 whatever instruction and broadens
 is bound to be a factor in business mat-
 ters. Linn county has always taken a
 forward step in matters of this char-
 acter, something that helps to make
 this a home county with a very at-
 tractive offering for those who wish to
 reside among a progressive people
 with hospitality.

REGARDLESS OF PREJUDICE.

The Democrat as a newspaper gives

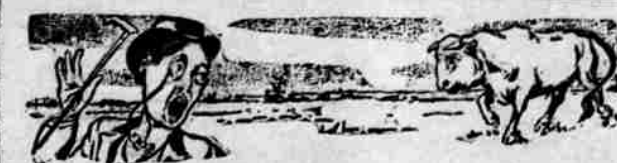

WHAT THE LEGISLATURE
SAVED FOR PEOPLE

Statesman: Oregon's twenty-
 eighth legislative assembly kept its
 pledge of economy in appropriations
 and made for the support of the state
 during the next two years according
 to the first authoritative figures com-
 piled in the office of Secretary of State
 Olecott.

The total of the appropriations was
 completed yesterday and the figures

show that the recent legislature's en-
 tire appropriations under existing
 laws amounts to \$6,310,648.67. This is
 a saving of \$381,313.41 over two years
 ago. The legislature of 1913 made a
 total appropriation of \$6,691,962.08.
 The total given above includes the
 funds derived from the millage taxes
 and in reality were not directly ap-
 propriated by the legislature. This
 millage tax figures, of course, neces-
 sarily are only estimates.

Excluding the millage tax moneys
 and a few minor items, the recent as-
 sembly appropriated \$644,500.05 less
 than two years ago. The figures of
 the secretary of state show that the
 total set appropriations at the recent
 session amount to \$3,965,615.70, as
 compared with \$4,610,175.75 in 1913.
 J. E. Allison, bookkeeper in the sec-
 retary of state's office, compiled the
 figures on the appropriations. He
 has done the work for the past few
 sessions and it is believed no errors
 have been made as Mr. Allison is
 considered one of the most expert
 accountants in the state.

Of the appropriations made by the
 recent legislature the sum appropri-
 ated for the two insane asylums is
 the largest, totaling more than a mil-
 lion dollars. For the asylum at Sa-
 lem \$705,334.76 was allotted, while for
 the Pendleton institutions \$308,159.25
 was appropriated.

The Oregon Agricultural College in
 money devoted for the extension and
 experiment station work will receive
 \$977,900. This amount includes \$760,-
 000 derived from the millage tax.
 The University of Oregon with its
 medical department will receive
 \$724,002.04. Of this sum \$570,000 is
 obtained by millage tax.
