THE WORLD OF DEBTORS.

The department of commerce of the U. S. government has just issued a statement of the indebtedness of the United States, showing the whole, per capita indebtedness, etc. When do you suppose it is for? For 1913, two years ago. It has taken the compilers two years to get the information out of the public in detail. By this time it is stale, though somewhat interesting because of the character and importance of it. A business man or big concern of importance would not think of being two years in making a report of business conditions. Any way here are some of the figures on indebtedness increase:

Countries, 107 per cent; cities, incorporated towns and villages, 83 per cent; unincorporated townships, etc., 29 per cent; independent school districts outside of cities, towns and villages having over 2,500 inhabitants, 34 per cent, said to be more apparent than real, being due to a more thorough canvass. The increase from 1890 to 1902 was 76 per cent. New York City heads all the cities, with a per capita indebtedness of \$107.71, and New York state owes the most of any state. All the cities of the country owed \$3,500,000,000, and the grand total of all our indebtedness, state, county and city, was \$4,850,560,713.
