THE FALL OF A FORTRESS.

Gradually things are happening, forts tumbling, towns giving up, over the Atlantic. The fall of Przemyśl is one of the notable events of the war. It was a long stubborn siege, in which the defenders were finally practically starved out. One of the strongest of the fortresses it was considered impregnable; but nothing is now impregnable against human genius and perseverance. The whole was as brutal as it has been a disgrace to civilization, yet has divulged methods of generalship of a new order, in a way almost paralyzing the senses. Perhaps genius in warfare is progress; but it is not the kind that appeals to the average person, who prefers to look for efficiency along other and greater lines. The things that operate for humanity, that help to make life easier, endurance sweeter, association pleasanter, are far better than those that can operate only for destruction and enmity.

TRACY AND MERRILL WAY.

As an example of the selfishness and weakness of human will power and character, when self-reliance, a minister told the story of Tracy and Merrill, so familiar to Oregonians a few years ago. After escaping and driven to the last ditch, in order to help in saving his own life one of them turned and killed his partner in crime, a beastly act. That looks like depravity, and yet all around men and women for selfish purposes and greed sacrifice the most sacred interests of life.
