CLOSE OF COUNTRY'S MOST REMARKABLE REVIVAL

Probably the most remarkable "revival" in the history of the United States has just closed at Philadelphia, under Billy Sunday. Here are the very interesting figures, as taken from the Philadelphia Ledger, just received in Albany:

"Billy" Sunday's personal offering, inclusive of Saturday's contributions, amounted to \$51,135.85.

Largest check received for thank offering, \$5,000.

Smallest contribution to evangelist's fund, one cent.

Attendance at 146 services in the tabernacle during the 11 weeks of Sunday's stay in the city estimated at 2,500,000.

Conversions, approximately 45,000.

Current expense collections, secured in first six weeks of campaign, \$52,000.

Collections for charity during latter weeks of campaign, \$15,630.93.

Sunday preached 146 sermons, of an average of 4,000 words each, filling, in round figures, 384 newspaper columns.

At a conservative estimate, "Billy" has pounded on his pulpit at the tabernacle upward of 5,000 times, and walked up and down the narrow platform at least 100 miles.

The tabernacle audiences, for the 11 weeks, would pack to overflowing every Philadelphia theatre every night for an entire season.

The tabernacle corps of physicians and nurses reports 1173 "cases" treated, mostly women who fainted.

More than 5,000 babies and small children were cared for at the tabernacle nursery where their mothers heard "Billy" preach.

Standing with outstretched arms, hands clasped, the men, women and children who have heard Sunday in the tabernacle at one or another of the meetings would make a line extending more than 2,000 miles, or Philadelphia to Denver, Colo.

"Billy's" monetary tribute from Philadelphia, if changed into silver dollars, placed side by side, would mark a glittering line a mile long.

Philadelphia's gift to "Billy" and members of the revival party would require an ordinary box car for shipment.

Largest number of trailblazers at any single meeting in all the evangelists' career, 964. This number represents the women who "hit the trail" at yesterday's farewell service for women only.

Smallest number of converts at any one Philadelphia service, 84.

Four hundred churches cooperated in campaign.

More than 500 outside meetings were conducted by the Sunday aides in the 11 weeks.

Two choirs of 1800 voices each led the singing at the tabernacle.

Seating arrangements were in charge of a corps of 1000 ushers and doormen, who served without pay.

The junior high school building is now up almost two stories, and will soon be ready for roofing. At the front entrance is a sign—"Danger. Keep Out." When school begins this will be taken down.

The two partners will come here direct from their second year's stay in New York with their entire establishment taken "in toto" as Lawyer Feldman would say from Broadway and will open shop at the Albany Opera House on April 2d.
