CIVIC IMPROVEMENT.

Every improvement made in Albany that shall make this a better looking city appeals to all. Already it has a splendid reputation for its many fine looking buildings, neat streets, pretty homes, well kept lawns, etc.; but there are other things to consider, and there is no such thing as stop in the forward movement of a city. A great many things can be pointed out that need to be done for further improvement. At different points are old shacks, barns in unsightly places, trash, etc., which need considering. Many good looking places offer opportunity for still further improvement along modern lines, and no place is so artistic it cannot be made more so. Civic improvement is a great work in a city, something that calls for constant attention and good judgment. A city does well when it makes this an issue. Over in Corvallis for some time a special campaign has been made along the line of beautifying that city, with excellent results reported. Nothing works like everlastingly keeping at a good thing.

RESTORING CONFIDENCE.

That confidence is being restored in Oregon in a decided manner is the statement of the Salem Statesman, one of the state's most conservative Republican papers:

Confidence of the people of Oregon in the future and a rapid recovery from the financial shock administered to the country with the outbreak of the war in Europe, is evidenced in the statement issued yesterday by Superintendent of Banks Sargent showing the banking situation in this state.

Although the total demand deposits for Oregon show a decrease of more than seven million dollars since a year ago, the total time deposits have increased nearly two and one-half millions of dollars during the past 12 months. Postal savings have increased greatly since a year ago, but during the last three months a decrease is shown.

In the decrease in deposits financial experts see a sign of growing confidence that the United States will not become involved in the war. They believe that the people as a whole are withdrawing their savings for investment purposes.

"Today Oregonians along with the residents of other states are over their first fright," said a prominent Salem banker yesterday, "and they are putting their money into legitimate investments. Money is easier now than six months ago, and I predict that the greatest era of prosperity for this country in its history is beginning. Signs of the end of the war are now evident, and with its cessation things will go ahead as never before. We have learned one thing, and that is that this country is self-sustaining and does not have to depend on Europe for its material prosperity."

Referring to the falling off in deposits in Oregon banks, Superintendent Sargent said:

"A decrease in deposits does not always mean a corresponding falling off in business, and the decrease in savings deposits during the past three months may have been due to the fact that people have been withdrawing their savings for the purpose of making more profitable investments."

The total demand deposits according to the examiner's statement have decreased \$7,204,957.62 since the call of a year ago and \$408,249.52 since the first of the year. Time deposits show an increase of \$2,441,404.67 for the year and a decrease of \$267,122.90 since December 31, 1914. Postal savings also show an increase for the year and a decrease of \$13,211.70 for the past three months.

"It will be noted," said Superin-

tendent Sargent, "that loans and discounts show an increase of \$3,028,000.21 since the call a year ago, but they have been reduced \$2,411,874.61 since the call of December 31, 1914."
