BIRD PROTECTION LAW IS STILL EFFECTIVE

Department Will Continue to Prosecute Illegal Killing of Migratory Game.

Washington, D. C. April 5.—Many of the press comments on the decision of the United States district court, rendered March 20, at Topeka, Kansas, holding that the federal migratory bird law is unconstitutional, according to the United States Department of Agriculture, are erroneous and are apt to mislead the public concerning the real situation in this matter.

The Kansas decision, like a former decision to the same effect in the Eastern District of Arkansas, is limited in its operation solely to the district in which it was rendered. Neither decision settles or nullifies the law, and the exact contrary has been held by the United States district court for South Dakota. The Arkansas case has been appealed to, and is now pending in the United States supreme court. The act of congress protecting migratory birds stands effective until the supreme court finally decides the question of its constitutionality. In the meantime, it is incumbent on every law-abiding citizen to observe its provisions and the regulations. It is the duty of the department of agriculture to enforce this law and the officials in charge will endeavor to do so as long as it is in force. Reports of violations will be carefully investigated and when sufficient evidence is secured they will be reported for protection. In this connection it should not be

No. 577.—It is the duty of property owners, or agents, having property on streets, with sidewalks, to cut and remove from the streets and curb all weeds, grass and brush, as often as necessary to keep down. Penalty \$5 to \$25.

Ordinance 581.—It is the duty of property owners or agents to remove all moss from buildings, the chief engineer to enforce the ordinance. Penalty \$5 to \$30.

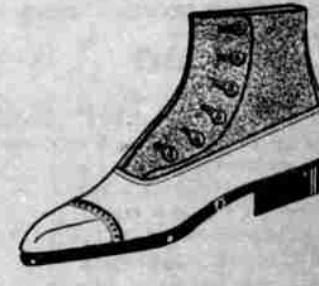
