## STYLES AND FABRICS IN DEMAND THIS SPRING

Fashion has come back to mid-Victorian times for inspiration this year. Short, gathered skirts, trimmings of buttons, braids and velvet ribbons, and close clinging bodices with modestly high necks and sleeves of equal modesty, covering the arm, are all reminiscent of the early days of the young Queen Victoria, and some of the modern costumes are exactly like certain old-timers frocks lifted from family treasure chests for comparison. Another striking feature of the Victorian period, notable in this spring's fashion is the combination in silks, plain and figured silks, or striped patterns used with plain silks are exceedingly smart—much smarter indeed than either plain or patterned silk used alone; and this fact should be held in mind when you set out to purchase material for the new silk frock. Do not be dismayed at the vivid colors and striking patterns of the new silks, at the huge polka dots, as large as silver dollars, at the bewildering checks and stripes which are in such zigzag effects that they make one a bit dizzy if the eye lingers too long on the pattern; for most of these silks are indeed to be used sparingly, in combination with a plain shade in matching tone.

**Flowers on Striped Grounds the Craze**  
Little nosegays of striped colored flowers imposed against a background of fine black lines are particularly smart and mid-Victorian. Many of the charming new pussy willow taffetas for spring and summer use show these nosegay and stripe patterns and one especially quaint design has small baskets of flowers scattered over a finely striped white and blue ground. The prettiest of these nosegay silks have white grounds on which the delicate tints of the flowers show up daintily; for more practical silk frocks there are pussy willow patterns in the new oblong or diamond shaped checks. These checks come in printings of blue and black, green and black, orange and black, sand and blue, and so on. Particularly smart are some black and white patterns, borrowed from Austrian decorative motifs and called the Viennese patterns. These have large black and white blocked checks and printed black and white flowers scattered over the checked ground or wavy black lines wandered across a white ground. Air-lined in black in a design suggesting the undulations marked on a chart by a seismograph.

**Khaki-Kool the Silk Sensation of the Season**  
Much credit is due to the American makers who have brought out this remarkable new silk for summer wear. The various khaki-kool weaves resemble handsome shantungs and rajahs, but there is a novelty in their texture and a smartness in their colorings that have made them instantly

popular for distinguished tailored costumes for summer traveling and city club wear. One of the big fashions of the fifth month of the year is a whole wardrobe devoted to these stunning khaki-kool silks and to good looking, tailored frocks and suits made of them. These silks come in the favored sand and putty tones, in a rich dreadnaught gray and in pearl white—a particularly modish shade this spring.

Combinations of silk in self color are also very much favored, and frocks showing these combinations are liked by women who prefer rich, plain colored fabrics to flowered patterned effects. The use of one silk with another, even when the shades match identically, produces an effect of contrast; as for instance when bands of faille classique silk trim a full skirt of pussy willow taffeta, or a ruffled skirt of pussy willow is accompanied by a bodice of crinkled crepe with pussy willow bands and motifs.

**Airy Sleeves for Coolness.**  
Chiffon and net sleeves will be worn with silk bodices—but the chiffon or net is usually doubled before cutting out the sleeve and the guimpe to which it is attached, for a decolette effect is not part of Fashion's design now. The overbodice of silk is never sewed fast to the guimpe, but is quite separate from it, though a few artfully placed snap-fasteners serve to hold the two garments together in correct lines. Sometimes he silk overbodice is in form of a bolero, falling over the belt. Skirts are frankly gathered to the belt, though the gathers are usually pushed to the sides where most of the fullness of the skirt comes. All skirts measure three yards around at least and the skirt escapes the ground from four to eight inches according to the maturity of its wearer and the slenderness of her figure, and below it her dainty buttoned boots or high heeled slippers are coquettishly revealed.

**Flowered Organdies Again.**  
Every woman is pleased to see the lovely flowered organdies back again. Dotted swisses are another charming, old fashioned fabric revived this year. Ecru or sand-colored hatsties are excessively fashionable, and with these are combined sand-colored nets and shadow laces. Stockings of natural colored silk are the fad with frocks in these sand, or natural tones.

## DIVERSITY OF STYLES ALLOWS FOR INDIVIDUALITY

There is no doubt that "individuality" is to be kept the key note of fashions in the spring and summer clothes for women. Never before has there been such a diversity of styles. Suits from Bolero to hip length, semi-fitted, loose fitted, blouse effects, half empire effects, long waisted ideas and ripple

effects below and above the waist, high military collars and low-necked saffronian shapes. High-class novelities and severely plain tailored models are in perfect good style, provided they embrace certain features in vogue.

But no matter what the style of the jacket may be, there is one part of the costume that is definitely decided upon as settled, and that is the skirt. All skirts are cut full and flaring; the width at the hem is merely a matter of taste for the individual woman who orders her suit. However, a stylish width and one that is much favored by the "Elite" at the moment is from two and three-fourths to three and one-fourth yards at the bottom. Some reach a width of four yards, but this is mostly in light materials or silks; in fact, it seems to be a maximum to use more fullness in silks or pongees than in wool fabrics.

**Military Terms in Dress.**  
Military terms creep into the dress of women as easily as in the war stories from battle-torn Europe. We have Tipperary turbans and cloth, Belgian blue, torpedo buttons, submarine shapes, khaki suits and many other reminders of the war. It seems almost as if the fashion starters named something after one of those Russian or Polish towns that requires three sneezes and a couple of coughs to pronounce.

## FOOTWEAR CONFORMS TO OTHER STYLES IN DRESS

The day is past when man alone considered footwear the most important article of apparel. Man has never had skirts to cover up his feet—since the day sandals and togas were discarded for boots and breeches—and he has felt the obligation of keeping the boots spic-and-span. Woman, if her boots were pretty ones, could reveal them—if she wished. If they were not all that boots should be, she could hide them under her skirts. Now that she has no skirts for six inches from the ground up—the question of footwear becomes paramount with her also, and the bootmakers have seen to it that her footcoverings are not only spic-and-span, but dainty and charming as feminine heart could wish.

**Military Boots for Military Costumes**  
The sensation of the spring in footwear is the new military boot for wear with short, flare-skirted military tailcoats and frocks. A natty, regimental affair indeed is this spring boot, with trim, slender lines of toe and heel, a top of light colored cloth, rather high because the new skirt is so short, and with from fourteen to

twenty laces. The military not hosiery manufacturers are making hose with braided and button designs to simulate a boot top to be worn with black pumps. The boot of accepted correctness for spring wear with street costumes of tailored style, is the beautifully shaped buttoned boot with long, tapering lines of aristocratic suggestion, a rather high curved heel, and a top of cloth in one of the fashionable neutral shades. The daintiest of these boots are in gaiter effect, a narrow, gracefully curved vamp of the patent or dull black leather used also for the foxing running up above the heel and giving the light cloth top, at a little distance, the effect of a gaiter neatly strapped over the foot.
