FOR BETTER ROADS.

This forming a partnership with the government in securing better roads is a movement that appeals to people generally. Easy access to mountain resort regions is a great thing for a county. This has been seen in the manner in which the resorts up the McKenzie are reached from Eugene. People reach Finley's and Belknap's in a short time. In this county it is a task to go to Cascade, a finer place than any in Lane county. Some of the roads are horrible, and it means damage to an automobile to attempt to make the trip. This road should be put in first class condition, so that it will be possible for automobiles to make the trip from Albany with ease in three hours. Whenever a resort is built up into a popular place it means business for the entire county in which it is located. The statement was recently made that at least two hundred automobiles were on a trip up the McKenzie, where only a few were seen up the Calapooia. By acting with the government this ought to be overcome and the Cascade region made as accessible as any in the state. From what ever viewpoint seen good roads are business.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF.

The anniversary of the birth of Thomas Jefferson occurred yesterday. No man who has honored American history has ever spoken words that have had greater weight than have his expressions on public matters. During his life some of the nations of Europe were in an awful death struggle, and it was then that Jefferson spoke these words, so timely at the present time:

"We have seen with sincere concern the flames of war lighted up again in Europe, and nations with whom we have the most friendly and useful relations engaged in mutual destruction. * * * In the course of this conflict let it be our endeavor, as it is our interest and desire, to cultivate the friendship of the belligerent nations by every act of justice and innocent kindness. * * * To punish severely those persons, citizen or alien, who shall usurp the cover of our flag for vessels not entitled to it, infecting thereby with suspicion those of real Americans and committing us into controversies for the redress of wrongs not our own. * * * To exact from every nation the observance toward our vessels and citizens of those principles and practices which all civilized people acknowledge; to merit the character of a just nation, and maintain that of an independent one. * * * New principles, too, have been interpolated into the law of nations. * * * The rights of a neutral to carry on commercial intercourse with every part of the dominions of a belligerent permitted by the laws of the country (with the exception of blockaded ports and contraband of war) was believed to have been decided. * * * To former violations of maritime rights another is now added of very extensive effect. The government of that nation has issued an order interdiction all trade by neutrals between ports not in amity with them."

LARGE TRACT OF TIMBER SOLD TO KLAMATH FALLS CO.

Portland, April 13.—The district forester at Portland announced today that the Pelican Bay Lumber company of Klamath Falls, Oregon, were the successful bidders on the sale of the largest body of government timber ever advertised by the Forest Service in Washington or Oregon.

The sale includes two units, one of 85 million feet of yellow pine and other species on the west side of Klamath Lake, and a second unit of about 300 million feet of nearly pure yellow pine located just east of Crater Lake National Park. The prices on unit I are \$3 per M. for pine and 50 cents per M. for other species; the prices on unit II are \$3.37 1-2 per M. for pine and 51 cents per M. for other species. The removal of the Douglas fir and white fir is optional with the purchaser. A cutting period of twelve years will be allowed for the removal of the timber. The total value of the timber is reckoned at \$1,250,000, of which the state of Oregon will receive \$437,500 as its share for the benefit of schools and roads.

The Pelican Bay Lumber company has been cutting National Forest timber for about four years. The company's mill was burned last summer, but it has been rebuilt and enlarged and is ready for immediate operation.

New Workmen's Compensation Law.

An important change is the adoption of a new rate schedule, effective July 1st, next. Under this schedule there are fifteen rates, ranging from 50 cents to \$8, based upon the hazard of the various industries. Under this new rating the workmen's contribution will be one cent for each day or part of day employed.

To encourage accident prevention, the amended law provides that whenever for a period of twelve months the amounts paid out or set apart on account of injuries to the workmen of an employer do not exceed 50 per cent of such employer's contribution, his rate shall be reduced 10 per cent—if such record be maintained a second year, another like reduction shall be made.
