DR. GAEBELEIN SAYS PROPHECY BEING FULFILLED

That Soon the Jews Will Again Own Palestine As A Nation.

That the prophecy of Daniel has been fulfilled to the letter was the declaration of Dr. A. C. Gaebelein, at the U. P. church last night in his second address on the book of Daniel. A large audience was present, it being necessary to use the gallery. According to Dr. Gaebelein, as Daniel had said the time from the rebuilding of Jerusalem to the crucifixion of Christ was exactly 483 years, leaving seven more years to be fulfilled; that then the Jews began to be scattered over the world and the seven years shall not begin until they again have been returned to their own country, which shall be established as a nation. This is about to occur. Sixteen years ago a movement was begun by Dr. Herschel working towards this end, and a big change is taking place at Jerusalem. This great work is working towards this end. Europe is depending upon the finances of the Jews to keep the war going, and if they should withdraw their financial support it would have to cease. When it does end from exhaustion the whole of Europe will be dependent upon the pocketbook of the Jew, and in the adjustment of affairs he will be given Palestine as his own country. This was the analysis of the situation by Dr. Gaebelein. He declared that the present day evils are a complete vindication of the Bible, and said: "In just a little while Christ will come again." This afternoon Dr. Gaebelein spoke on the work of Christ in Incarnation, and tonight his subject will be The Present Work of Christ. Tomorrow afternoon the services will be at the U. P. church and in the evening at the M. E. church.

EXPERT MAKES ESTIMATE ON THE WHEAT CROP

The Showing Indicates a Big Increase Over That of the Previous Year.

Portland, April 14.—On the basis of the winter and spring acreage already planted and from preliminary reports received from over two hundred correspondents the Pacific Northwest will in the coming harvest produce a wheat crop of from 63,000,000 to 69,000,000 bushels. Last year's crop of wheat in the northwest states was 62,000,000 bushels. The increase will be due to a liberal increase in planting. The total acreage is 3,846,000, compared with 3,627,000 in 1914. The estimate for Oregon is 180,000 acres of spring wheat and 900,000 acres of winter wheat. The present standing of the crops is above the normal. Even in the dry land sections the spring wheat is indicating an uncommon yield. The biggest gain is in the winter wheat, which is heavy.

NEW ORDER OF SAGAMORES LAUNCHED IN WASHINGTON

Something Entirely New With Feathers of Many Significances.

Certificate of incorporation was filed in the office of the Secretary of State of Washington for a fraternal organization which is a new departure in every particular. The new organization is known as the Stalwart Sagamores of the Iron Feather. In addition to the ordinary fraternal benefits, the new concern proposes to sell at wholesale and retail the neces-

sities of life (without profit) to its members and the general public. This will be accomplished by each local lodge owning and operating a retail store and by the society at large operating a central wholesale establishment.

The emblem of the order is an Indian head cut in cameo, with headband of eagle feathers enamelled in metal. The feathers numbered from one to seven denote the several degrees of the order. The feathers indicate the holder's degree and standing in the lodge. The first degree will be the tribal significance, the second degree will be gold, the third degree will be silver, the fourth degree bronze, the fifth degree brass, the sixth degree copper, and the seventh and highest degree a feather of the most useful of all metals—iron. The officers of the supreme lodge will be chosen from the Sachems of the Iron Feather and the officers of the organization from the members of the Supreme Lodge.

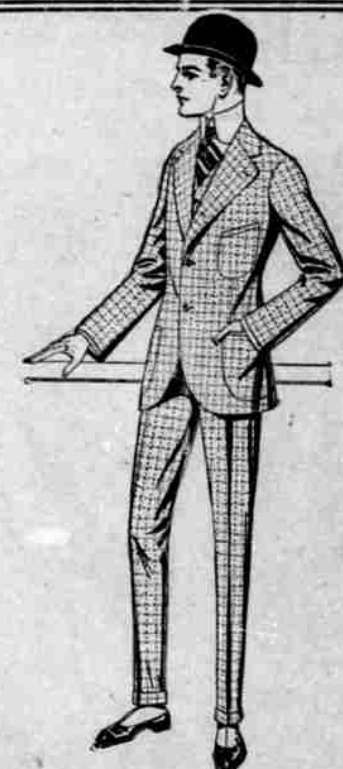
Membership are common and ordinary decency and great good humor. The applicant must show that he is a good fellow before he can become a Sagamore i. e. a "good Indian."
