DAIRYING A GREAT ASSET.

One of the most valuable assets in the business of Albany is the dairying business, with the Albany creamery as an assistant. Through the creamery alone it puts into circulation between \$150,000 and \$200,000 annually. Through other sources a large amount of money, as some send their cream to other creameries, and quite a number make their own butter and sell it, some to Albany merchants and others off on contract, or to special customers. The Democrat knows one dairyman alone, who does his own business, who has a net output to his dairying of close to \$2,000 a year. Speaking of the dairy, an expert at the O. A. C. says that as a means of wealth dairying is said to furnish about the most steady and sure income of any farm product and it also affords a renewal of soil fertility. In all these features dairying particularly lends itself to profit because profit must be secured from those resources that are sure and steady.

The history of dairying in countries other than the United States affords evidence of the reliable character of dairying as a profit maker. Denmark, a country declared to have had an exhausted soil and an exhausted people has become through dairying one of the wealthiest and most productive of all foreign countries. The Danes now are a remarkably prosperous people and have renovated their soils so that they are leaving a valuable heritage to their posterity.

Examples of success are being repeated in our own country. In the states of Wisconsin, Minnesota and those further east, they have redeemed their soils from exhaustion through dairying. While doing this they have made substantial money profits, established a large trade in dairy products, and perhaps best of all have built up large dairy herds of wonderfully producing ability.

From the fine high producing dairy cattle from these herds many western dairymen are now going to get foundation stock for the improvement of their own herds. A lot of money from the West is streaming in to the states of Minnesota, New York, and Wisconsin in exchange for dairy sires developed through scientific breeding by progressive dairymen.

PUNGENT WAR STORIES.

A Berlin newspaper suggests that there are 20,000,000 pigs in Germany who are robbing the people of their food and urges the government to kill and pickle them.

A German newspaper advertising for a new editor states that owing to war and the depleted condition of the staff, the editor's hours would necessarily be from 4 a. m. to 10 p. m.

WORLD WIDE WAR TRUST.

(By Cong. Clyde H. Tavenner.

I sat recently in the house of representatives and heard the Hon. Augustus Gardner, of Massachusetts, make the statement upon his responsibility as a member of the American congress that—

"If war were to break out today, it would be found that our coast defenses have not sufficient ammunition for an hour's fight!"

Whether or not Mr. Gardner's statement is correct, I cannot say, because I do not know; but this I do know, that we do not have the ammunition and armament that we have paid for and should have in return for the countless millions of dollars of the American people's money that have been expended from the public treasury.

I mean to say that those army and navy officers who do the purchasing of war munitions and who are paid a salary by the people and are trusted by the people to see that the government receives a dollar's worth of material for every dollar expended, have permitted a ring of ammunition manufacturers to outrageously overcharge Uncle Sam for armor, guns, powder, and munitions in general.

For instance, the war department in 1913 purchased seven thousand 47-inch shrapnel from the ammunition ring, paying \$25.26 each therefor. At the same time precisely the same shrapnel was being manufactured in the government-owned Frankford arsenal for \$15.45, all overhead charges included.

tile that they could have manufactured in government plants for \$15.45.

This instance is not the exception; it is the rule. The army and navy officers in 20 years have purchased \$175,000,000 worth of armor, armament and munitions from four firms which have a monopoly in this country on the manufacture of supplies and have paid this grasping war trust from 20 to 60 per cent more than the same articles could have been manufactured for in government plants.

As the result of frequently repeated statements similar to that made by Mr. Gardner, the average citizen is at last beginning to ask: "What becomes of the \$250,000,000 that is being spent annually on our army and navy? Who, pray, is getting the money?"

And it is time the people are beginning to show anxiety, because their money has been squandered like water, and unless Mr. Average Citizen wakes up and removes the wool from his eyes it is going to continue to be squandered.

The American people have never been let into the secret of who the profit makers are in the traffic of war and preparation for war in this country, and the methods by which they help themselves at the public trough. I will go further and venture the assertion that not 30 members of congress know the identity of the select ring of patriots for profit into whose pockets the millions of the masses are pouring, which gentlemen have a water-tight monopoly in this country on the traffic of war trading and who have drawn down every penny of \$50,000,000 in excessive and extortionate profits from the government by direct virtue of their influential friends in the army, the navy, and in congress.
