WILSON'S NEUTRALITY.

President Wilson's address on neutrality, recently delivered, was a masterpiece of logic. It was like all of his addresses, practical and comprehensive. The country has never had a president more to the point. It is this respect he is very much like President Lincoln. President Cleveland stated things well, but he hardly got down to the essence of a great question with the poignancy of President Wilson. His words on Neutrality particularly appeal to one now, because of the critical conditions of the times. It is true that the United States has passed through the crisis and is rapidly reaching a stage of confidence in continued peace for this country, and the ability of our government to keep completely out of the trouble. This has been wonderfully helped by the manner in which the president has handled the situation, backed by the administration. The newspapers of the country, as a rule, have been glad to do their part, though some have not, taking a decided stand in the matter. But the rule has been one of strict neutrality. Of course it is the business of the press to give the news as it is received, not responsible for its colorings. In that matter, both great press associations have been very careful.

VALUE OF PEACE EFFORTS.

Under Jane Addams and others the women of the world are preparing a peace conference at The Hague, to take place next week. They propose an endless chain propaganda, reaching out over the world, with many side issues and influences. The movement deserves endorsement, just as all movements do that have a tendency towards peace. At the same time it will practically have no weight. This war is like a great glacier slowly wending its way downward. So enormous is the weight that nothing can stop the action forward, until the bottom is reached. This war is like that. It is being impelled forward by forces that will not listen to reason, and only the bottom will stop it. When one side or the other is completely exhausted or beaten then will there be negotiations for peace. When this occurs will be a great time for peacemakers to get in their work, not for the present but for the future. For there will be more wars if nations continue their policy of armament, and this will undoubtedly prevail as long as governments are dominated by the class of men who now are at the head of affairs of the world over, with perhaps the exception of the United States.
