A CORVALLIS MAN WHO MOVED FROM ALBANY

J. M. Nolan Tells About His Thirty-First Anniversary in Corvallis.

Corvallis, G. T. April 21.—Today is the thirty-first anniversary of J. M. Nolan's removal from Albany to Corvallis. "Just thirty-one years ago today, or rather this evening, for it was already dark," Mr. Nolan stated this morning, "I stepped off the stambord with Tom, then a baby, and established Corvallis as my residence. The town looked good to me, and looks good to me now, for that matter, but there was a bonus on then. The railroad was building, and I had been living in Albany where there had been a couple of big failures, and I came to Corvallis because I thought it was the better town, and I never have been sorry for a single minute."

When Mr. Nolan first came to Corvallis he bought the Max Friendly stock, then in process of closing out, and established his business in the room now occupied by the Corvallis State Bank. "When I came to Corvallis," he continued, "I had about two hundred dollars, and I stuck it all into a five hundred dollar stock of goods, and ran my face for the other three hundred. I was a younger man then and I hustled—I used to walk up the street as rapidly as if I had been a resident of Chicago—and it wasn't long before I had that five hundred dollars worth of goods paid for and had increased the stock. In fact, we've been increasing it ever since."

ers. Commenting on the small number of beggars in London since the war, the London Mendicity Society attributes the cause to the many aid societies now caring for "war refugees."

"Billy" an Irish terrier who carried a sign, and a basket on his back has already collected 200 packets of tobacco and other articles for the men in the trenches.

Two hundred twenty-one Catholic churches in refugee ridden London, are now hearing confessions in Flemish, French, Italian, German, Spanish, Dutch, Gaelic, Maltese, Portuguese, Greek, Hungarian, Lithuanian and Russian.

A London newspaper has instituted a campaign in which the English people are asked to write letters to motherless boys in the trenches.

London court gossip has it that Princess Mary will go to the front during the early summer to visit soldiers in the trenches.

A big British insurance company is reported paying salaries to staff members as high as \$50,000 annually who are now serving the colors. Other employees at the front receive from \$400 to \$3,000 annually with 4 per cent interest.

Issuance of game hunting licenses in London have fallen off fifty per cent during the past six months. Enlistments to hunt Germans, however, has increased several thousand per cent.

Signor Giuseppe Accorci claimed the invention of an automatic anti-aeroplane gun which discharges when the aircraft crosses a direct line with the periscope.

A story from the trenches in France says that when the Prince of Wales visited the firing line officers and privates alike were given a half hour's notice by "phone so they could 'slink up.'"

OREGON DOINGS.

Oregon has now approximately 17,000 automobiles, and 2400 motorcycles.

In view of the 70 miles of paving to be done out of Portland, the cost of pavement is being investigated. Municipal Bureau Chief Dulin says pavement can be put down for 60 cents a yard, and urges the county to do its own work. The Democrat is informed that the actual cost of the Ninth street pavement, for which \$1.15 was paid, was 68 cents a yard.

There are public improvements in sight in Portland that aggregate \$8,640,000. Here are some of them: Columbia bridge, \$1,750,000; 70 mile road, \$1,250,000; post office building, \$800,000; auditorium \$500,000; five steel bridges, \$200,000; street work, \$500,000; sewer work, \$15,000; Kennedy school, \$40,000; Franklin, \$110,000; Couch, \$170,000; Shattuck, \$170,000; Faulton Park, \$24,000; Richmond addition, \$55,000; detention home, \$25,000; also public grain elevator, besides private work that will be done.
