A DEVELOPMENT AGENCY.

In a short time the Growers' Association will be launched upon the Willamette valley. The Democrat expects to see it an important agency in the development of this part of the valley. We hear of long-felt wants. This is one of them, because it will be the means of furnishing a market for the things we raise. There is no use of raising products unless they can be sold. What is a tree full of apples if they cannot be sold, and are permitted to remain on the tree or ground and rot. Peaches are a choice fruit; but there is nothing in raising them unless they can be sold, and at a reasonable price. Last year \$1.50 was received for them, under organization, where 90 cents was received where there was no organization. This has been the history of the whole Northwest along numerous lines. Wherever there is a growers' association there has been universal good prices and a steady market. Take centers like Puyallup and Wenatchee and a good example is offered of the results. The Democrat hopes to see a cannery in connection with the enterprise; but not until this section has the fruit to run it as it should be run. There is nothing but disappointment in cannery unless there is enough fruit for it; then it may be made a success. This will come as a result of the organization.

NOT DRYING UP

For sometime it has been feared that the world was drying up, and that we are losing ground in the physical part of the problem; but now we learn that this is not so. Prof. Smith, of the U. O. settles this authoritatively. He declares the earth is not losing moisture, and is not in the afternoon of its existence, that instead it is getting bigger and better all the time. Here is what he says, and it is so interesting we give it:

The earth is not beginning to lose moisture and atmosphere, and is therefore not in the afternoon of its existence; instead it is still getting bigger and wetter, according to certain present day geologists, among whom is Warren D. Smith, Ph. D., professor of geology in the University.

"It is the chemist's view rather than the geologist's that the earth is passing its prime and will in time become a dead body like the moon," says Dr. Smith. "The latest researches in geology seem to indicate that the earth is still growing in size and acquiring moisture. As it grows it attracts more and more atmosphere instead of losing what it has."

"Besides getting the material that is always being fed into the earth in the form of meteorites, we may any time drift into a part of space that is even richer in world-building particles than the part of space we are in now. Many geologists believe that the present lifeless condition of the moon is one which the earth passed ages ago. We are more apt to be smothered because the air has become too thick and moist than we are to dry up and blow away."

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. May 12, 1915, for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in Oak street trunk sewer, midway between Seventh and Eighth Streets, and running thence easterly across Block 1, across Pine street, and 168 feet into Block 2, all in Hackleman's Woodland Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder, where plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. May 12, 1915.
No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a verified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$175.00 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of July, 1915, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 for each day of delay beyond that period.
