ROSEBURG MAY PAY \$300,000 FOR R. R.

Kendall Brothers Propose to Build Road and Saw Mill If Bonds Are Sold.

Roseburg, Or., May 4.—That the railroad to be built from Roseburg to the boundary of the forest reserve 30 miles east of here may ultimately be extended to Boise, Idaho, is the information contained in a letter received from Kendall Brothers of Pitts-

burg, who are to build the road, and a large sawmill near this city, providing the citizens of Roseburg vote a \$300,000 bond issue to aid in the project and donate the rights of way for the railroad. Kendall Brothers also stated that their company would build a sawmill of 250,000 feet daily capacity instead of 200,000 feet as previously planned.

This information contained in a letter to Attorney O. P. Coshaw in which Kendall Brothers asked Mr. Coshaw to apply for a charter for the railroad, the same to have a capital stock of \$1,000,000, and with the ultimate extension and destination at Boise, Idaho. The main office is to be at Roseburg. After the charter is secured perma-

nent organization is to be effected. J. L. and S. A. Wendall, of Pittsburg, J. L. Snyder, of Wellsboro, Pa., O. P. Coshaw, of Roseburg, and three Roseburg men yet to be selected are to be named as incorporators. Although the title to the railroad is to vest in the city of Roseburg, the charter is to be secured at this time so that rights of way may be condemned.

Kendall Brothers also stated that in a short time J. L. Snyder and R. S. Johnson, a sawmill designing engineer, will be in Roseburg to draw plans for the sawmill to be erected here. Besides making the proposed mill 30,000 feet daily capacity more than originally intended, the plant will be so designed that its capacity may, at any time, be doubled.

mon ailments are spread, and the way in which they may be prevented. This warfare against disease has resulted in the abolition of the deadly roller towel and the common drinking cup by the natives in general, and this hygienic reform has spread even as far as Point Barrow, the most northerly point in North America.

To those interested in public health activities, it is of great interest to note the progress made in promoting hygiene and sanitation during recent years throughout the civilized world. In this respect our words in Alaska, the Indians and Eskimos, have not been neglected. The United States Bureau of Education, which has supervision of the native schools of Alaska, is cognizant of the urgent need of sanitation in the native homes and villages in order to check and eradicate the communicable diseases, the effects of which have decreased the native population 14 per cent during the period of 1900 to 1910, according to the U. S. Bureau of Census.

A part of the appropriation for education of the natives of Alaska is being expended for the maintenance of three improvised hospitals. All schools are provided with simple remedies and a medical handbook of instructions. Lectures on tuberculosis, eye diseases, ventilation, care of infants, preparation of food, and other subjects pertaining to disease preventive measures are delivered. These talks are supplemented by individual instructions in the home. Pamphlets on the cause, prevention, and cure of tuberculosis have been issued to pupils throughout the school service, and "How to Keep Well" cards placed in the homes. Various bulletins issued by the U. S. Public Health service on health subjects have been distributed to field workers for their information and guidance. Paper towels and individual drinking cups are being used in the schools in place of the common articles and their value explained to the children.

This campaign of warfare against disease is showing results. The natives are being educated to hygienic living, care being taken not to inculcate the customs of the white man unless they will bring about a betterment of health and economic conditions. This has resulted in a general improvement of the health of the natives of Alaska, and already morbidity and mortality rates from the various diseases have begun to fall. The natives have cooperated heartily in this work. It is interesting to think what results would follow a similar cooperation on the part of the whites in the United States.
