were reported rescued. The state department admitted it likely that others were dead. The state department's figures showed 184 Americans on board.

Queenstown, May 8.—The direct charge of many of the passengers of the Lusitania is that they were persuaded to get out of the life boats

and return to the liner by stewards, who ran along the side of the vessel crying, "She's all right, she wouldn't sink." This is made by R. J. Timmons, of Texas, cotton buyer.

Queenstown, May 8.—According to stories of survivors, the Lusitania was torpedoed without warning. The first torpedo exploded in the stoke-hole. Splintered steel flew high in the air and the great boat shook from stem to stern from the shock. The second explosion followed immediately. This torpedo completed the tragedy. The fumes from the explosives permeated every section of the smashed steamer. Many passengers fell on the deck unconscious, others staggering blindly, made their way to where the life boats were being lowered. Within a few minutes after being struck the Lusitania listed rapidly and sunk in from twelve to fifteen minutes.

Queenstown, May 8.—A telephone message from Kinsale said that of fourteen of the Lusitania survivors taken there five died from exhaustion and other injuries.

Body of Chas Froman Found. Liverpool, May 8.—The body of Chas. Froman, the noted American theatrical man was found near where the Lusitania was sunk, a cablegram from Queenstown announced.
