PRESIDENT'S PROBLEM.

The big papers of the country generally are sustaining the president in his very difficult task of settling the matters of the Lusitania and the Gulf-light. They are appreciating more than in the past the necessity of the people of this country being united in giving the president the hearty support he needs in the proper disposal of this colossal international question. There may be some jingo sheets that will not help to make it easier; but most of the large papers regardless of party will do so. It has already become evident that Germany has not been trying to provoke the United States to anger; but on the contrary has a friendly feeling towards this country. Its position is that it has established a definite policy that must be followed; that it has placed a war zone of a definite limit, which must be observed, and that the condition in reference to carrying ammunition for use in the war must operate. This may be easily settled in the case of the Lusitania, because there had been due warning, and it is admitted that the steamer carried forty-one hundred cases of cartridges, which are certainly ammunition; but in the case of the Gulf-light, an American vessel, it is different. About the only solution is either the fact that it was not a German submarine, or that if it was the Gulf-light was mistaken for an English boat because directly behind several such boats.

The Democrat is confident the president will meet the solution of the two cases with the same splendid judgment that has characterized all his deliberations so far.

PACIFIC HIGHWAY.

The Pacific Highway is now open through the state. Automobiles are passing through Linn county very easily, making the trip from Eugene to Albany in between two and three hours. This is interesting news in view of the many comments on the condition of the roads. Some oil would help wonderfully. The roads should be kept in a good condition during the summer, not an easy thing with so much dust as generally prevails. They should also be put in condition to permit travel during the semi-rainy season, if not during the entire winter. There is no reason why there should not be automobile travel through the state the year round.

WAR ODDITIES.

London—Hundreds of Saturday afternoon tea drinkers at the Piccadilly hotel cheered vigorously when the orchestra played "In Der Nacht," a German composition whose author, Max Winderfeld, is in the German army.

Flanders—A trench newspaper edited by the soldiers contained the following item:

"A telegram informs the kaiser that England, terrified by the German blockade, has removed from its usual place and has been towed to an unknown destination." "We are following in pursuit," reads a telegram signed Von Tirpitz."

London—Controllers have been appointed in British West African colonies to wind up the affairs of German and Austrian firms.

Cairo—The British army in Egypt has abandoned the camel to a great degree and has purchased 500 mules from North and South America at an average cost per head of \$100.

Flanders—A British regimental band played ragtime in a trench until the Germans in a nearby trench sought the aid of German artillery several miles in the rear to silence the "noise."

Paris—A neutral correspondent of a Paris newspaper who traveled in Austria brought back a postcard showing German Uhlans under the Arc de Triumpe in a fancied occupation of Paris.

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. May 12, 1915, for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in Oak street trunk sewer, midway between Seventh and Eighth Streets, and running thence easterly across Block 1, across Pine street, and 168 feet into Block 2, all in Hackleman's Woodland Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder, where plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. May 12, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$175.00 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of July, 1915, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 for each day of delay beyond that period.
