SAID GREAT THINGS.

In his Philadelphia speech President Wilson said some great things. Here are some selected by a Republican paper:

"There is such a thing as a man being too proud to fight. There is such a thing as a nation being so right that it does not need to convince others by force that it is right."

"The example of America must be a special example not merely of peace because it will not fight, but because peace is a sealing and elevating influence in the world and strife is not."

"You can't be an American if you think yourself in groups. America does not consist of groups. A man who considers himself as belonging to a national group is not yet an American."

"My advice to you is to think first not only of America, but to think first of humanity, and you do not love humanity if you seek to divide humanity in jealous camps."

"I am sorry for the man who seeks to make personal capital out of the passions of his fellow man. He has lost the touch and ideal of America, for America was created to unite mankind by the passions that lift and unite and not by the passions that separate and debase mankind."

"The man who seeks to divide man from man, group from group, interest from interest, in the United States, is striking at its very heart."

PERMANENCY NEEDED.

More and more the fact is demonstrated that cities are entitled to good roads leading out from them, and into them; not only because they pay big taxes, but because they are a greater thing for the entire country, advancing materially the commercial interests of all who have any kind of dealings with the city. Another thing that is being demonstrated is that the best is none too good. This is especially true of roads. In the long run they pay the best. It is said that Linn county spends about \$80,000 annually on its roads, and that 90 per cent of this is for patching up old roads, very little for new roads, or permanently improved roads. Many think we have reached that time when we should do things permanently, not just for a short season; but for the years to come. When this is done it should first be out of the market cities, so that the people of the section may have their advantage. Naturally more people go to a county seat than anywhere else, and it should be looked after, gradually reaching out into all sections. Whatever the program of the future it is time that there be some permanency to it.

Advertisement for Sewer Construction

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. May 12, 1915, for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in Oak street trunk sewer, midway between Seventh and Eighth Streets, and running thence easterly across Block 1, across Pine street, and 168 feet into Block 2, all in Hackleman's Woodland Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder, where plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. May 12, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$175.00 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of July, 1915, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 for each day of delay beyond that period.
