The paving of Second street will soon be awarded to the same paving company. A bill passed provides for the time and manner of improving Second street from Lyon to Main, how the cost shall be distributed, penalty for damage, etc. The paving is to be completed by Sept. 1st. if so desired, his company would remove the 12 old arcs and 100 candle power lamps on Lyon street and replace them with 16 of the new lamps. The proposition was accepted.

An ordinance introduced by Councilman McElmurry will, if passed, prohibit minors from frequenting billiard or pool rooms without the written consent of their parents. The ordinance also provides for the closing of pool rooms at the hour of midnight and on Sunday. The bill provides penalties of from \$10 to \$25. The bill was referred to the committee on ordinances.

Another ordinance by Councilman McElmurry will cut down the license fees of pool halls. The reduction is about 50 per cent of the present. Bowling alleys shall pay \$5 for each alley and pool and billiard rooms will pay \$2.50 for each table. This was also referred to the ordinance committee.

Councilman Pfeiffer introduced a resolution to appropriate \$250 to assist in improving Riverside Cemetery. The matter was deferred until the next week.

A resolution to improve Second street from the east line of Main street to the west line of Sherman street was adopted.

Another resolution was adopted for the improvement of Pine street from Salem road to Santiam road, with gravel was adopted.
