THIS VALLEY.

William C. Levere, of Evanston, Ill., after being out here, his headquarters being Corvallis, while in Oregon, went back home and wrote about the valley in the following glowing terms:

"The air is sweet in Oregon. The fragrance of bud and bloom is everywhere. The sloping hills are of an emerald hue, which would match even the far-famed shores of Erin. The western coast line, like the homes of the ancient Celts, is beneath a sky whose face, though sunny, is saturated with moisture.

"For the last few days I have been riding up and down the Willamette valley. Surely this is the garden of the Lord. It may be that the Eden of Adam and Eve was on the island of Ceylon, but it would be easy to believe that it was here. The entire length of the valley, and it is 150 miles long, is a paradise of spring. Its meadows seem to almost sing their color into your face. On the sides of the valley, as if they were its guardians, are mountain ranges, some of them snow-capped, and though the days are warm, there is a reassurance that the breezes of the evening will be cool and soft.

"At Corvallis we see Mary's Peak, the queen of the Three Sisters, while Mount Jefferson is seen from other points along the valley. But the sublime, and I know of no other word that will do, the sublime glory of all is Mount Hood. It is far away, so far that its massive white head takes on an ethereal atmosphere, and if ever distance lent enchantment, it is here. I do not want to use totally opposite terms to describe it, but if ever the two words, 'majesty' and 'daintiness,' can be used together, they can of Mount Hood. Sometimes the sun flashing down upon its crest illumines its hoary head and then you get the idea of its majesty. Then again, you can just trace its outlines in a softer light, and the vision you get is deserving of the most delicate word in all your vocabulary.

"And the falls of the Willamette. One wonders that they have not been pictured more. Their scenic value is so great that even the endless chain of mills and factories which line the shores of the wide-spreading river here, do not detract from them. It is such earthly attractions as these that makes you hope the creed of the pre-millennialists is true, and when the final day comes, it is to be this old world which is to be our ultimate heaven. Surely with wrong and wretchedness gone, there could not be a better one.

"At Corvallis you get a picture of the young manhood and young womanhood of Oregon. Here at the very fine campus, you find sixteen hundred young people preparing for their life work. If anyone has an idea that the students of an agricultural college have hayseed in their hair, he ought to see these boys. No finer type of American collegian exists anywhere, and though I have always

been partial to the charming young ladies on the Evanston campus, these Oregon beauties are quite in their class."
