SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

This has been a serious week with the people of the United States on account of the loss of the Lusitania, and the manner in which it has involved the United States, on account of a good many of our people being on board of the destroyed vessel, many losing their lives. With other things that have happened our government has some problems to settle that will require long heads, cooled down to the limit. So far those at the head have shown that they possess equanimity as well as firmness.

The bitterness of the war is illustrated in the severe measure taken in London, where naturalized Germans have been mistreated, though they have sworn to be loyal to England. The suspicion is intense. The old saying that blood is thicker than water evidently continues to hold good.

In personal matters one does well never to enter into a personal combat unless driven to the wall and compelled to defend himself. Why should not a nation do as individuals. It is not cowardice not to fight with a fellow man over some dispute, often of little importance, but often bravery. At the same time there is such a thing as international rights that must be respected, and in a war like this one, the rights of neutrals should remain inviolate, and not be trampled upon.

In Oregon there has been very little of a striking character. The annual grangers convention is always of importance, a gathering of representative men, back of the greatest industry in the world, the men who hold the purse strings and keep things on the move. The position they take on leading issues is always viewed with interest and concern, and generally means a good deal. Even politicians have learned to respect the wants of the farmer.

The work of local talent is bound to interest at least their friends. We watch professionals critically but when it comes to our people we are very properly ready to be charitable. Often this is not needed, as amateurs frequently are the equals of professionals, sometimes their superiors. All professionals were once amateurs.

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m., May 26, 1915, for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in Oak Street sewer between Water and First Streets in the City of Albany, Oregon; and running thence westerly across Oak Streets and through the center of Block 8 of Hackleman's Third Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon, and to within 40 feet of the east line of Sherman Street in the City of Albany, Oregon, a distance of 272 feet.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$1000 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.
