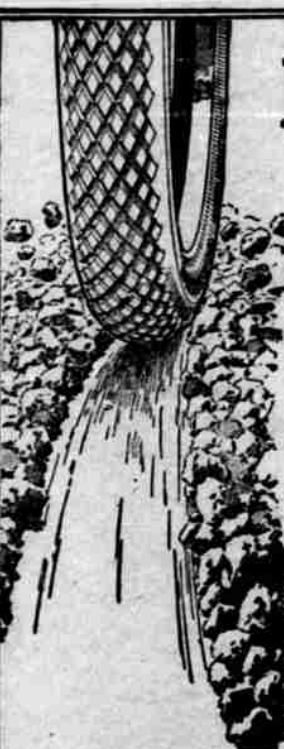

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m., May 26, 1915, for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in Oak Street sewer between Water and First Streets in the City of Albany, Oregon, and running thence westerly across Oak Streets and through the center of Block 8 of Hackleman's Third Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon, and to within 40 feet of the east line of Sherman Street in the City of Albany, Oregon, a distance of 272 feet.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder, where plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 o'clock p. m., May 26, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$10,000 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of August, 1915, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 for each day of delay beyond that period.
