WHY REVENGE?

A woman of Bari, Italy, wrote to the poet d'Annunzio: "I am representative of all the poor mothers in my town. With joy we give our children to the country. We do not know what advantages Italy may gain from the war. We wish to avenge Belgium, to avenge the victims of the Lusitania and all the innocent people who have been so brutally killed."

So the spirit that dominates the war is revenge, not because this one woman shows it, but because it has shown itself all through the horrible affair. But what recompense is there in revenge; what gain is there in getting even with a nation or an individual even for a wrong that is plain? Why so much blood in the world in order to even up old offenses.

The spirit is a poor one in nations as it is in individuals. Cases have been known where men held a resentment for years, one founded on some small matter of little concern, even going so far as not to speak to one. Life is too short for allowing the bitter to dominate one's existence.

The United States might see many places that called for a display of righteous anger, and call up the feeling of revenge; but it does well to be governed by a higher sentiment ready for adjustment of differences.

DON'T BE DISCOURAGED.

People are too apt to get discouraged over things, from mercantile business to crops. A farm paper tells of a striking case that came under observation:

"An Iowa farmer a few years ago had about a hundred acres of winter wheat which seemed to have been ruined by the winter. He started to plow it up, and when twenty acres had been plowed he was interrupted by weather. Before resuming the job, he looked at it again and found it improving. Work being of a pressing nature, he let the other eighty acres stand, and harvested a crop of 34 bushels to the acre.

"It was a matter of weather. The crop stood and stood, and there were ten heads where it looked as though there might be one or two."

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m., May 26, 1915, for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in Oak Street sewer between Water and First Streets in the City of Albany, Oregon, and running thence westerly across Oak Street and through the center of Block 8 of Hackleman's Third Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon, and to within 40 feet of the east line of Sherman Street in the City of Albany, Oregon, a distance of 272 feet.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder, where plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 o'clock p. m., May 26, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$10,000 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of August, 1915, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 for each day of delay beyond that period.
