OMAR, THE TENT MAKER WAS BEST PLAY EVER

Guy Bates Post and Company Present Beautiful Persian Play Last Night.

Old Omar Khayyam, or the tent-maker, appeared at the Albany Opera House last night in all his Oriental splendor and glory, and with all the wisdom and philosophy accredited him by his chronicler, Edwin Fitzgerald, author of "The Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam." Richard Walton Tully, author of the play presented last night, followed very closely the life of the ancient astronomer and poet, and the conditions of the time of his life, in the eleventh and twelfth centuries, and introduced in many parts of the play some of the most beautiful quatrains of the poem.

From a scenic standpoint the play was superb. Every piece of the elaborate stage settings was carried with the company. So magnificent and heavy was the scenery for the second act that it required 36 minutes to make the change, but the audience was patient and did not seem to mind the wait, which was filled out by excellent violin solos by the company's musician, and music by a splendid local orchestra. All through the play was beautiful.

And the acting of Guy Bates Post was the best ever seen on the local stage. In the first act, or prologue, he gave a delightful interpretation of Omar, the young lover, and in the later acts his emotional powers were brought out most strikingly. Miss Louise Grassler, as Shiraz, in the prologue, and later as The Evil Banou, was the most delicious, and the audience was completely captured by her pretty features, melodious voice, and emotional acting. The entire large cast was good, from Post, to the veriest slave. It was, without a doubt, the best theatrical event ever offered the Albany public, and in spite of repeated warnings by the press and numerous personal recommendations, the play was greeted by a house about half the size that the importance of the production deserved.

Advertisement for Street Improvement.

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock P. M. June 9, 1915, for the improvement of Main Street from the south line of Water Street to the south line of Fourth Street, in the City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner, to-wit:

First: By grading said street to the proper subgrade.

Second: By paving the roadway of said street full width with full intersections with asphaltic concrete pavement on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Third: By laying and constructing asphaltic concrete headers.

Fourth: By constructing catch basins.

Fifth: By constructing inlets.

Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe.

Seventh: By laying sub-drain tile. Said improvement to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the said City of Albany, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder, where plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 o'clock P. M. June 9, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract, and provide and approved bond in the sum of \$2,000 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of award of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said improvement prior to the 15th day of October, 1915, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$25.00 for each day of delay beyond that period.

HUMAN SIDE OF SHOW PEOPLE NOT SEEN BY PUBLIC

In every walk of life there are human interest stories of which the public at large is unaware. In the theatrical profession this is true to an extent larger, perhaps, than in other lines of business. The companies are on the road much of the time, and the players in the public eye from a professional viewpoint all of the time.

The public forgets the human side of the business.

At the Hotel Albany this morning the Democrat reporter met the manager of the Guy Bates Post company, Mr. W. D. Emerson, of New York, and listened to some of his talks about the stage and topics of interest in general.

It was the original intention, said Mr. Emerson, of the management to jump from Seattle to San Francisco, owing to the poor houses that have greeted big productions all along the coast, but owing to the pressure of Cal. Heilig, of Portland, who bought

the show outright for the Portland engagement, they decided to play Portland, and take in some of the smaller towns along the line. The actual results of last night's show here is a loss of about \$300 to the company, which is at an expense of about \$500 per day.

In playing here the company was at a disadvantage on account of the small stage, the space being so small that part of the settings had to be placed in the wings and did not allow for sufficient room for the players. Mr. Emerson was very bitter over the treatment accorded him by the local stage hands, who, he said, departed after the show and left the work of unloading the large amount of heavy scenery on the cars to his eight stage men. They were until 7:00 o'clock this morning getting everything on the cars.

The season will be extended three weeks, Mr. Emerson says, and make the resting period but five weeks instead of eight before reopening at the Lyric Theatre in New York. The company, with but four changes in the 21 characters, has played together since organization and feels like a big family, and the management contrives to keep them intact. They are a fine looking lot of players, and Mr. Post makes one big family of them. There are 33 members of the company in all.

Upon his arrival in the city, Mr. Post was met at the hotel by Carl Sox, a prominent attorney of this city, who was a playmate of Mr. Post when they were boys in Seattle.
