The war has been going on just as
fierce and bloody as ever the past

Sealed bids will be received by the
Council of the City of Albany, Ore-
gon, until 7:30 o'clock P. M. June 9,
1915, for the improvement of Main
Street from the south line of Water
Street to the south line of Fourth
Street, in the City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in
the following manner, to-wit:

First: By grading said street to
be proper for grade.

Second: By paving the roadway of
said street full width with full inter-
sections with asphaltic concrete pave-
ment on an asphaltic concrete founda-
tion.

Third: By laying and constructing
asphaltic concrete leaders.

Fourth: By constructing catch bas-
ins.

Fifth: By constructing inlets.

Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer
pipe.

Seventh: By laying sub-drain tile.

Said improvement to be made in
accordance with the charter and or-
dinances of the said City of Albany,
and the plans, specifications and es-
timates of the City Engineer on file
in the office of the City Recorder,
where plans may be seen and speci-
fications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 o'clock
P. M. June 9, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be consid-
ered unless accompanied by a certi-
fied check payable to the City of
Albany in an amount equal to five
per cent of the aggregate bid, to be
forfeited as fixed and liquidated
damages in case the bidder neglects
or refuses to enter into a contract
and provide and approved bond in the
sum of \$2,000 for the faithful perfor-
mance of the work within ten days af-
ter notification of award of contract
or such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view
of completing the construction of said
improvement prior to the 15th day
of October, 1915, under a liquidated
penalty for damages of \$25.00 for
each day of delay beyond that per-
iod.

The council reserves the right to
reject all bids deemed unreasonable.
