OLD TIME MANNERS.

Rules of Good Behavior in the Early
Eighteenth Century.

In a work entitled "Youth's Behav-
ior," published in 1700, there is this
injunction to young gentlemen, "Put
off thy Cap or Hat to persons of Des-
ert as are Churchmen, Justices and the
like, turning the Cap or Hat to thy
self; making a Reverence, bow-
ing thyself more or less according to
the custom of the better bred."

In the midst of remarks which indi-
cate the utmost refinement we come
suddenly upon such directions as this:

"Tis not manners as soon as you
are set at Table to bawl out, 'I eat
none of this, I eat none of that, I care
for no Rabbit; I love nothing that
tastes of Pepper, Nutmeg, Onions,'
etc.

After stating that "some have been
so refined in Foreign parts that they
will neither be covered, nor sit with
their backs to the picture of an emi-
nent person," the writer goes on to
remark that "there are some who eat
with that eagerness and impatience,
they eat themselves out of breath and
will pant like a broken winded Horse,
but these are not to be endured."

He also warns his pupil thus:
"When you are talking to any one do
not continually punch him in the side
as some people do; who, after every
sentence keep asking the person they
are conversing with, 'Did I not tell
you so?' 'What say you, sir?' and in
the meantime they are every moment
