LIBRARY NOTES

There is an exhibit showing the growth in the art of book binding now on display. The oldest book found is one owned by Miss Elizabeth Irvine—Geneva 1565. The tree call of the early 14th century is well illustrated in one loaned by Father Lane. Another one is bound in olive wood from Jerusalem with inlaid mosaics.

There is also an exquisitely bound copy of Pope illustrating gold tuling. The twentieth century is illustrated by two beautifully bound copies by Paul Elder.

In this connection is also an illuminated missal painted by Father Henry. It is an altar card containing the first chapter of St. John, and the beautiful rich reds, blues and gold and the artistic and emblematic work are attracting much attention.

Mrs. LeRoy Wood has assisted in making the collection. It is planned now to make a Roycroft shelf to illustrate the artistic work of the late Elbert Hubbard. All those having a sample of Roycroft binding, and who are willing to loan it for this collection, will please call up Mrs. LeRoy Wood.

Lord March became decidedly uncomfortable when he read the inscription plate, engraved with his own name and title and the date and year of death, and peace was patched up.
