BRYAN'S RESIGNATION.

The resignation of W. J. Bryan as secretary of state has attracted wide attention. It could not do otherwise. Coming at a critical time in the pending negotiations between the United States and Germany over the use of submarines there is much speculation as to the effect it will have on affairs. Some declare it is very untimely and may affect the course of Germany to our detriment. Others think it will show Germany that the administration means business and is firm in its determination in reference to the protection of Americans traveling towards Europe. Some are looking for an opportunity to criticize Mr. Bryan and will be quick to condemn whatever he does. Others appreciate his splendid character and strict integrity, knowing that when he does a thing it is purely from conscientious motives.

Mr. Bryan in an interview states that he believes he can do better service out of the cabinet in keeping the United States out of the war than in the cabinet. Mr. Bryan is unequivocally opposed to war and is in favor of continued negotiations looking to its prevention. In this regard most Americans are back of him. The sentiment against the United States entering the war is intense everywhere. What is known as jingoists are willing to have war if it will advance their interests and operate in the interest of party aggrandizement. The writer, like Mr. Bryan, is in favor of forbearing much, appreciating the wormth of the situation across the Atlantic, rather than get mixed up in the unholy squabble, a war without a reason for it. It is possible the moral influence of it may not be for the best. That is a matter, though, that will be better understood after it is known what position Germany will take in reference to the note that has just been sent to Germany as a rejoinder.

The library aids every movement in the progress of the city. A Mer-

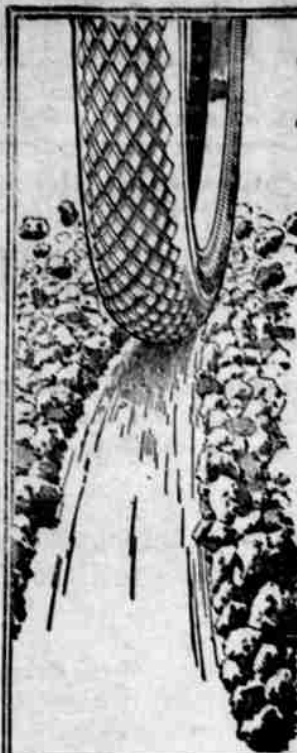
