COTTAGES FOR TEACHERS.

Oregon is not the only state that has new ideas. Texas is doing things. Among other departures, is one that has a provision for cottages for rural school teachers, so that they will not have to board around, a very unpleasant and unfortunate way of living. Mr. William Olmstead, of Texas, who is visiting here tells of the arrangement. The cottage is made not only large enough for the teacher, but for several boarders, if wanted. It is also planned to have several acres adjoining as many as six cottages, for the use of the school. Other states are taking up the idea, and it is said it is liable to be universal in time. Among the states that have recently fallen in line are Washington and Alabama. An article from a Texas paper, handed the Democrat by Mr. Olmstead reads as follows:

In Texas the school directors erect these cottages near the school house and one county has six of them. In one town the citizens bought the land and erected the house by subscription. This place has six acres of land around it.

In other places the teachers have five and six room cottages, live together on the cooperative plan and hire a woman to do the housework. Texas has over 100 teachers' cottages. The plan gives the teachers a chance for privacy and touch of home life that is lacking under the old system in vogue in other places. It is likely that the plan will continue to extend until there is a teachers' cottage in every school district.

Another paper says: The average age of rural school teachers is 19 years; their average length of service is six and one-half years. These facts among others have led the United States Bureau of Education, through Harold Foght, to work in the interest of securing permanent community homes for school teachers in the rural districts. The teachers' cottage in close proximity to the school plant is a new step that has much in its favor.

THE WAR TRUST.

Another trick in the trade of the war traders which is obviously profitable, otherwise it would not be continued, is the hiring of retired army and navy officials and ex-members of congress by the powder, armor, and shipbuilding concerns. These ex-officials know the inner workings of the military branches of the government, know the personnel in an intimate way, and by private conversation, by correspondence, and in various ways are in a position to obtain much useful information. They know how to go about things for results. Through these ex-officials the war trust has become thoroughly at home in Wash-

ington.
