Portland, June 10.—The receipts for the week at the Portland Union Stock Yards have been: Cattle, 584; calves, 227; hogs, 4206; sheep, 2685.

A steady market with light receipts. Quality of steer offerings is good to choice. She stuff selling well. Grass steers bringing \$7.50, demand fair.

Monday saw the largest run of hogs for some time, 3000 head being registered. Top hogs advance from \$7.85 to \$8.10, bulk of sales 8 cents.

Receipts have been light for this time of year. Prices lower on all lines except spring lambs which still brings \$8 for top quality.

SOME OF HUCKLEBERRY FINN'S MODERN PHILOSOPHY

Huckleberry Finn, of Lane county, was in Eugene this week, and was interviewed by the Guard. Here is some of his philosophy:

"If the Germans say 'no' to Wilson's note, and if I were Wilson, I know what I'd say," he declares.

"I'd say, 'I'm not going to interfere with Germans or any other nation, but I'm going to clean the submarines out of the straits between England and Ireland so our commerce won't be bothered,' and 'we could do it, too.'"

"I'd clean out that channel, I would. Uncle Sam has over 100 submarine destroyers and airships until you can't rest. We've got the strongest navy in the entire world. Wry, we've got one ship that could sail across the Pacific and clean out the whole Japan island. That's the Pennsylvania."

"Look at them bow guns—twenty-four inch bore and fifty-six feet long, and they can throw a ball 25 miles with a fair degree of accuracy. That's some shot, I tell you."

"We had a gun on the north side of the James that we built during the rebellion that could fire a 4,000 pound ball across the straits, and we thought that was some gun."

"Huck" Finn is a staunch republican yet he has some faith in the president.

"That will be Bryan's death blow," he commented over the press dispatches yesterday. "Things weren't working to suit him and Wilson was too smart a man for him."
