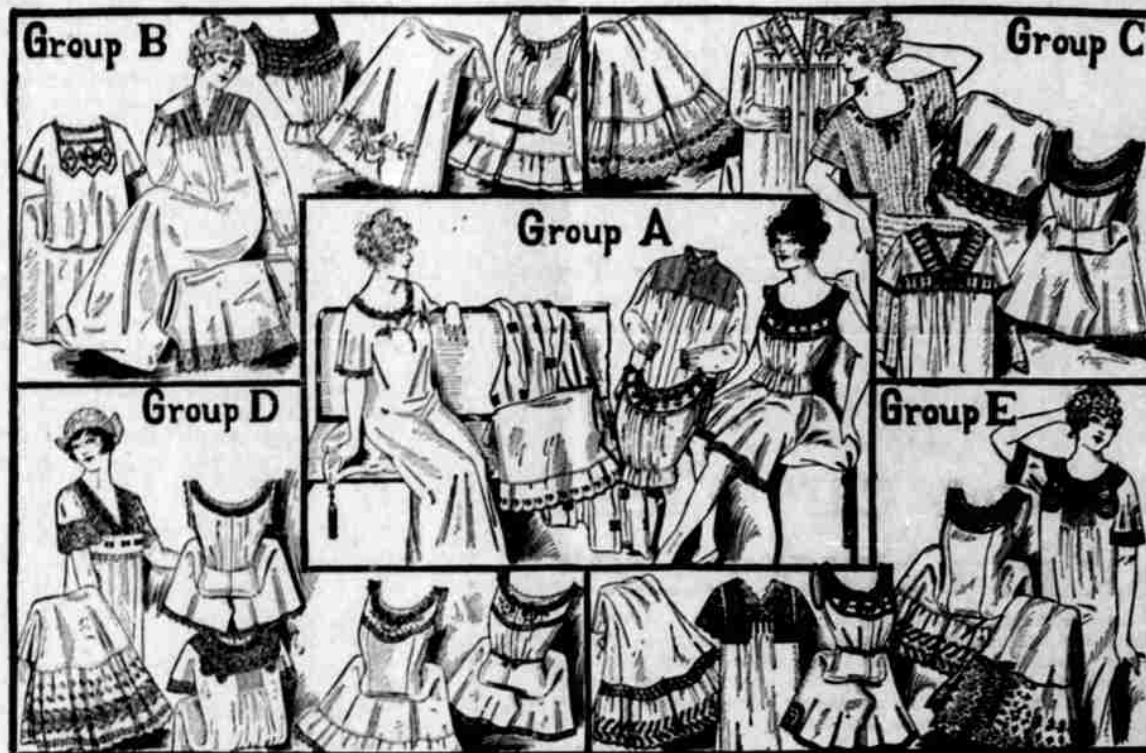

CARSON BIGBEE HAD A FISHING EXPERIENCE

Their Cabin Was Burned and \$75 Worth of Fishing Equipment Disappeared.

Eugene Guard: Carson Bigbee and Eddie Dorr, two University of Oregon students, returned last night from a successful fishing trip empty handed. They claim that they caught 212 salmon trout, but had nothing to show for them.

They state that they are unable to say whether the trout were cooked or stolen. Two guns, blankets, knapsacks and the balance of a \$75 fishing and camping outfit went the same route.

They had been camping in an old shack 30 miles up the Mohawk, nine miles from Mabel. They returned yesterday morning after a fishing trip to find their cabin burned to the ground, and not a remnant of anything left, except for a pile of ashes. The absence of the metal parts of the guns in the ashes, led them to believe that they had been robbed.

Part of their clothes was burned in the fire. Thomas Bailey, deputy sheriff, returned from serving some papers on the Mohawk, brought them back.

SHRINERS AND FAMILIES TO MEET IN SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., June 14.—Coming from every part of the country, 100,000 nobles and families of the Mystic Shrine will begin their pilgrimage late this month or early in July to the oasis of Seattle, where they will participate in the forty-first Imperial Council session.

Because of the many sights which the Shriners wish to take in while on their journey to the Northwest, many of the temples will leave home several weeks before the opening date of the convention. In their special trains they will assemble at Seattle and after the meeting is over, will distribute to every corner of the West.

A total of 150 special trains is expected. Fourteen special trains from the south will pour through Portland, Centralia, Chehalis and Tacoma, bringing the Oregon, California and Southwest temples to the meeting. Thirty specials will travel practically in one solid string from St. Paul westward, stopping at Spokane and crossing the Cascades by various routes.

One compact group of fourteen specials will act as escort for the Imperial Potentate from Spokane to Seattle Monday, July 12, comprising the most magnificent escort ever given a citizen in this state. The assemblage of the escort will take place in Spokane, the trains leaving one after another in solid array.

After the council meeting, the specials will either take their hordes south to California, stopping at Tacoma and Portland, as well as other points, or will go north through Everett, Bellingham and other points and going East via the Canadian Rockies.

Heavy Fog Stopped Fighting (By United Press Association)

Paris, June 12.—A thick fog north of Arras has completely stopped operations on the battle front, the war office announced. There has been little fighting for 24 hours. Owing to unfavorable conditions, the French occupied the time in strengthening their positions, especially about Neuville and St. Vaast.

safely to its base after the engagement.

Sailed for Germany.

(By United Press Association) New York, June 12.—Dr. Bernard Dernburg and wife sailed on the Norwegian American liner Bergenfjord for Bergen. He was guaranteed safe conduct by the allied powers. The unofficial spokesman of the kaiser will proceed to Berlin from Norway.

Italians Fighting.

(By United Press Association) Rome, June 12.—Three Italian armies are closing upon Goritz, 22 miles northwest of Trieste. The official announcement was made that Gradisca, six miles southwest of Goritz, was occupied. West of the city heavy fighting is in progress.
